AN humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and Gentlemen of the County of Hereford, has been presented to His Majesty by the High Sheriff of that County, introduced by his Grace the Duke of Chandos, Lord Lieutenant of the said County.

Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Madrid, Jan. 15, N. S. On the 11th Instant dyed the Marquess de Lede, a Flemish Nobleman, and Captain General of his Catholick Majesty's Forces; he served the Crown of Spain for 30 Years, and in the Years 1717 and 1718, commanded in chief the Spanish Army in the Expeditions against Sardinia and Sicily; and the last Year, in the Reign of King Lewis, he was appointed one of the Cabinet Council. Last Night their Catholick Majesties came to the Retiro to pay a Visit to the young Queen Dowager, and returned back to the Pardo. Letters from Cadiz advise, that a French Ship coming into that Port from St. Domingo, had brought an Account, that the second Ship which was under the Command of Admiral Guerrara was lost, (as well as that in which the Admiral himself perished,) with the Captain and most part of the Crew.
