**T**HE Marquess d'Aix is arrived with his Lady and Family from Savoy, and is making diligent Preparations to set out soon for Vienna, where he is to reside as Envoy from his Sardinian Majesty. The Prince of Franche-Ville is also come from Naples, upon Advice sent him that the Princess his Spouse was fallen dangerously ill: He has found her alive, but without Hopes of Recovery. On the 1st Instant died of a violent Fever the Count de Saluces, descended from a noble Family, and as he had the Character of a worthy Man and an experienced Officer, he is generally lamented; he was a Major-General and Captain of one of the Troops of Life-Guards. This Week arrived here Count Rotoski, a natural Son of the King of Poland, accompanied by a French Governour, and by Count Castelli, a Gentleman of this Country, who is in his Father's Service. He has a handsome Retinue, but being a little indisposed has not yet appeared at Court.

Stockholm, Jan. 20, O. S. Friday last the 15th Instant being the Anniversary of the present King of Sweden's Arrival at Stockholm, their Swedish Majesties received in the Evening the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers on this Occasion; There was a very splendid Ball at Court, their Majesties supped in publick, and an Ode in the German Language, composed by a very distinguished Genius in this Country, was sung to a fine Concert of Musick. There were likewise several other Tables, at which the Ladies and Persons of Distinction present were magnificently entertained. After Supper the Ball began again, and continued till their Majesties retired.

Vienna, Jan. 31, N. S. Field-Marshal Count Thau began his Journey from hence on the 28th Instant, and the Duke of Aremberg will follow him To-morrow.

Brussels, Feb. 14, N. S. Field Marshal Count Thau being expected here this Day, Orders were sent Yesterday to a Detachment of Dragoons to attend him at Tirlemont, and this Day another Party of 25 Dragoons with an Officer was ordered to meet his Excellency a League and half out of this Place. The Burgomaster of Louvain has been here for Orders and Leave to fire the Cannon at the Town's Expence on the said Count's passing through it; and the Magistrates of this Place propose to wait at the Gate with a Company of Burghers under Arms, to present the Keys to this our new Governour General.

Whitehall, Feb. 3, 1724.
