St. James's, March 1.

THIS being the Birth-Day of Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction: And at Night there were Illuminations, and other Publick Demonstrations of Joy.

Turin, Feb. 24, N. S. The Physicians having advised the Princess of Piedmont to take the Air frequently, the Queen and her Royal Highness went Yesterday with several Coaches to the Valentine about half a Mile off, attended by a great many Ladies and Gentlemen of the Court. The Affair of the Count de Sales has been decided by the Council of War assembled for that Purpose; but the Sentence is not yet made publick. Some Days ago died the Princess of Franche-Ville, and was carried to St. Pancratio, seven Miles from hence to be interred, that Place being an Estate belonging to the Family. The Regiment of Guards is to come hither in the Spring from Savoy, to relieve the Regiment of Montserrat which is now here in Garrison.

Turin, Feb. 28, N. S. The Sentence against the Count de Sales has been published by Sound of Trumpet at Vi-neuf, his Country Seat, and imports Beheading, Degradation from the Order of St. Maurice, and Confiscation of Estate. The Prince di Forresta of the House of Modena being lately dead at Bologna, the Princesses di Carignan his Nieces will soon go into Mourning: He has left them considerable Legacies.

Hague, March 2, N. S. The Deputies who were lately sent by the States General to the States of the Province of Zealand, returned hither four Days ago, and have made their Report to their High Mightinesses. M. Hop Ambassadour from this State at the Court of France, having desired to be recalled, it has been granted, and he is to come back hither next Autumn.
