**T**HE Marquis de Fenelon, Ambassadour from the most Christian King, arrived here the 6th Instant: The next Morning he made a Visit to the Baron de Welde- ren, President for the Week of the Assembly of the States General, to notify his Arrival; and the same Day he was complimented thereupon on the Part of their High Mightinesses. That Day likewise, the said Ambassadour sent his Secretary to notify his Arrival to all the Foreign Ministers here. The Marchioness, his Lady, came hither from Paris the 11th. The States General have sent Order to M. Wilde their Minister at Petersbourg, to make the proper Compliments to the Czarina, on the Death of the Czar, and on her Accession to the Throne. On the 10th the States of Holland disposed of the Civil and Military Employments vacant in their Repartition, and particularly gave the Command of a Regiment to M. de Langerac one of the new Nobles of their Province.

London, March 5.

On Monday the 1st of March, being St. David's Day, the Society of Ancient Britons established in Honour to the Birth-Day of Her Royal Highness the Princess and the Principality of Wales, had a very excellent Sermon preached before them at St. Paul's Covent-Garden by the Reverend Mr. Dean Harris, Clerk of the Cloister to His Royal Highness, (their President,) and afterwards went to pay their Duty and Compliment to their Royal Highnesses; when Sir John Austen representing the Right Honourable the Earl of Sutherland, in the Name of the Stewards, congratulated Her Royal Highness upon that Happy Day; from whence they proceeded with great Pomp and Magnificence, with Trumpets and Kettle-Drums playing before them, to Draper's-Hall to Dinner, where a very sumptuous Entertainment was provided; and the King and Church, the Prince and Princess, and all the Royal Family, and several other Loyal Healths were drank by the Stewards and the rest of the Company present, with loud Acclamations of Long live King George, King George and His Posterity for Ever.
