Madrid, February 26, N. S.

ON the 13th Instant their Catholick Majesties with the Prince of Asturias and the Infantes came from the Pardo to the Palace here; and the same Day the Infante Don Carlos was taken ill, which Indisposition proving to be the Measles, their Catholick Majesties, with the Prince and the rest of the Infantes, left the Palace on the 15th, and went to that of the Buen-Retiro. The said Infante Don Carlos is now so well recover'd, that he frequently goes abroad to take the Air. On the 21st a Courier from Paris brought the Marshal de Tessé his Recredentials, upon which he desigas to take his Audience of Leave of their Catholick Majesties in a few Days, in order to set out the 9th of the next Month for France. His Catholick Majesty has honoured the said Marshal with the Order of the Golden Fleece, into which he will be received To-Morrow with the usual Ceremonies. The same Courier brought Orders to the Abbot de Livry to remain here, for managing the Affairs of France, but not to take upon him any publick Character yet. His Catholick Majesty has appointed the Admiral Marquês de Mari to command the Squadron consisting of six Ships of War, which are to cruize this ensuing Summer in the Mediterranean.

Turin, March 7, N. S. It is advised from Vienna, that Count Harrach is named to reside at this Court as Envoy from the Emperour, and that he will set out in the Spring to come hither. His Sardinian Majesty has been pleased to bestow on the Son of the Count de Sales, all his Father's Estate which was confiscated, and intends to send him to the Court of Lorraine to be educated there; but the Comanderie in the Order of St. Maurice, which brought in a considerable Revenue to that Family, cannot be given away, by reason of the Count de Sales's Absence, certain Forms of that Order requiring that the Person degraded should be present. This being the Duke d'Aouste's Birth-Day, the Court was very numerous; and all the Ministers, with the Nobility, went to his Highness's Apartment.
