Lisbon, March 10, N. S.

ON the 4th Instant arrived here His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Lyme, Lord Vere Beauclerc Commander, in 10 Days from Genoa, but last from Gibraltar, whither she is to return very speedily with Supplies for that Garrison. At the same time arrived a Dutch Man of War which came Convoy to their Salt Fleet, which is now at St. Ubes taking in their Lading, and with which she is to return.

Madrid, March 12, N. S. On the 7th Instant the Marshal de Tessé set out for Paris, with his Grandson the Marquess de Maulevrier. On the 8th their Catholick Majesties return'd from St. Ildefonso. On the 9th a Detachment of Horse-Guards set out from hence for Burgos, in order to attend the young Queen Widow from thence, and conduct her to the Frontiers of France; the Day for her setting out from hence being fixed to the 15th Instant. The Marquess de Valero, President of the Indies and Lord Chamberlain of the Household, is appointed to wait upon her Majesty as far as Irun upon the Frontiers, where she will be delivered to the Care of the Persons appointed by the King of France; 100000 Crowns in Specie have been brought hither from the Mint-House at Segovia, for defraying the Expence of the said Journey. The Count de Onate, a Grandee of Spain of the first Class, died on the 10th Instant; but leaving no Issue, his Estate goes to the Marquess de Quintana, who is likewise a Grandee of Spain.

St. James's, March 20.

The Czarina having by a Letter to His Majesty notified the Death of the Czar, the Court goes into Mourning To-Morrow.
