### From Hunday December 18, to Whitsday December 24. 1671.

Falmouth, December 13. He 10 inftant arrived here the John and Mary of London from the Streights', the Seamen tellus, that off of Cape de Gatt, they met with a Brigantine, belonging to Argiers; mounted with forty Men and two Guns, who immediately boarded them, but found fuch brave refultance, that after the loss of feveral of their Ment, who were either killed or thrown over 'board, they were forced to retire ; in which Ingagement, the Master was by an accident unhappily killed, and fome of the Mén wounded; Julia

The 12 came in here the George of Hampton; laden with Wines from Burdeaux, from whence they came in Company of feven or eight Dutch Merchant men, all empty; the French, as the Maftero tells us, not permitting them to lade or take in any Provisions there.

Plymouth, Decemb. 14. Here are at prefent in this Port the Adventure of Landon, with Wines from Malaga, and the Eliqubeth from the Canaries, bound for London, with several other Merchant

Naples, Novemb. 24. The Prince of Macchia, having been lately taken. Prifoner by the Banditi of this Kingdom, and Treated by them not onely with much Civility, but likewife by order of their chief the Abbe Offaran restored to his liberty, without requiring any ranfome; the faid Prince to return them the like good Offices, is employing all his interest with our Governor, in behalf of the faid Abbe, and to that end, hath offered feveral Propofals for the reftoring him to the fame condition he was formerly in at this Court; but our Vice-Roy leeming somewhat hard to be wrought upon in this matter, it is thought, these endeavors of the Prince of Macchia, will hardly have any effect.

From Palermo we have advice, that the difturbance, or rather tumult amongst the people there, had been to great, through the want of Corne, which they found daily more and more to increase upon them ; that their Vice-Roy the Prince de Ligne, had been forced to leave the Town, and afterwards had very hardly, and not without great trouble, appealed them.

Florence, Decemb. 10. The Count des Prado is at length Embarked again at Legborn, on his re-turn for Portug 1. Yelterd ay went hance Mr. 780 mas Platt an English Gentleman, belonging to this Court, in quality of Euvoy from the Great Duke, to the Duke of Mantona.

Venice, Docemb. 12. Here is lately arrived General Bernardofrom his Government of Zaht, O'c. and yesterday was in the Senate to give them an account of the present pollure of affairs in those parts. The Grand Signior cominaes with his Court at Adrianople, whilft the general report is, that the Sultanefs, fince the death of her two Sons, is fled from Configurinople, leaving the Faction shere in great confusion, that alt Brand Signioi is binding thither the Grand Visier to fettle things, and to remove out of the Government of that place, such perfons as he may fulbed to be any way dangerous 'him to let fall fome of his pretences; and accept of

Bruffels, Decemb. 17. Altording to'our last ad-viewfrom Cologne, we cannot but look upon the affairs of that places as to an Accommodation, to bein avery bad condition, fince after to many Debates and Confultations, they have onely the fattle faction, if that be any, more and more to differn the little inclination there is on the other fide to com-pole things by a fair and equal Treaty. Count Marcin hath been for feveral days very'll but is at prefent much better again.

The Engliff Envoy Sir Robers' Southwell, conti-nues to be Treated at this Court in a very extraordinary manner; yesterday he waschtertained at a very noble Dinner by the Marquis de Morbeck, Captain of his Excellencies Guards, as he was this day by the Marquis d"Ocera Governor of Animerp; molt of the other Principal perfons of this 'Court, having in like manner Treated this Envoy fince his be: ing here.

Against the 20 instant here will be in Town about 150 Reformed Officers ; whether the fame may be employed in the new Leavies his Excellency intends to make, or be permitted to take fervice in the United Provinces, is not yet certainly faid:

Cologne, Decemb. i ?. We may well believe all parts hereabouts, to be at prefent filled with the news of an Accommodation", between us and out Elector, fince we out felves ldokt larely upon it; as a matter concluded, and that with fo much confidence, as to report it abroad with great tertainty; for when our Magiftrates had after fonte debate; notwichflanding they mer with many difficulties, accepted of the Project France by the Interval Com-mifiloners; and the Deputies of the Circle of Welt phalia s for a provisional accord, we' expected how thing lefs then, what hat his fuce happened; that bur Elector should have made new Objections; fo far s as to dath all the hopes we had of a Composite ? On Munday last the Bishop of Munster was with the Elector at Bon, endeavoring, as is faid to perfwade

the Project on foot, as framed by the Deputies; and 1 the 15 the faid Bifhop, entertained at a very noble Diuner at Kendernicke, the Imperial Conmittioners, the Deputies of the Circle of Weftphalia, and feveral of the chief of our Magiltrates, where there feemed to be much mirth and joy expressed on all fides, at the happy conclusion of this Treaty; the next day-the faid respective Deputies went with one of our Burgermasters to Breuil, to fign the Articles, for the last time, as they thought the Elector would likewife have done, who on the contrary, farted feveral new difficulties, and feemed to defre fome alteration in them, upon which, they all reneration. We difcourfe here with as much incertainty as for-ned hither again; the Deputies declaring at the a merly, concerning the forming a Flying Army, fame time, that fince after the many Proposals they had made, they could hardly frame any other, which could be faequal to both parties, as those they had already offered, they were refolved to depart to their respective homes; however, they have been so far wrought upon, as to have this day an other conference, but to what effect, we as yet know not. The Heer d' Amerongen, is arrived here from Holland.

Cologne, Decemb. 22. As long as the respective Deputies continue their Conferences, for the finding out some expedient to reconcile all difficulties, and bring matters to a conclusion, we cannot but flatter our Telves with a possibility, that yet things may come to an Accommodation; though in truth a there be but little appearance of it; in the interim we may justly apprehend the Designs of our Elector, when we see how these parts fill with Forfi reign Troops, and with what diligence the other preparations are still carryed on.

Bruffelt, Decemb. 22. Most of the Reformed Officers, spoken of in our last, are arrived here, and the reft are expected to morrow; it is faid, they are to go immediately for Gelderland, to be employed in some Leavies there that are defigned for the defence of Cologne.

Our Commissioners at Liste, for the determining the differences concerning the Dependencies, Oc. having not been able to effect any thing in that affair, are, as is faid, on their return hither again. His Excellency the Count de Monterey went hence yesterday, with intentions to visit Malines and Loeume, and to be here again the 26 inftant. We are told of a Treaty lately concluded at the Hague, for the defence and fecurity of Cologne.

The 17 inftant was published here, the third and last Declaration, for the summoning the Marquis d'Eyen, and the Baron de Batteville, to make their appearance, in order to the vindicating them felyes in feveral matters relating to the late Conquest of the Franche Comte.

Hague, Decemb. 25. The 22 inftant his Highnefs the Prince of Orange, went hence for Htrecht, with intentions to be the next day at Aernhem (where the States of Gelderland are at present assembled, by whom, as we are told from thence, his Highnel's will be received with all possible demonstrations of refpeft and kindness) and foto continue his journey towards the places belonging to the States on the Rhyn, which he goes to visit. The Velt Marshal Wurtz is still here, having on some particular considerations, altered his refolution of accompany. ing his Highnels on this jonrney, though it is thought, he may in some days follow him.

The 23 the States of Holland were affembled from nine a clock in the Morning, till fix at Night, as they were likewife yesterday; we hear not as yet, of any conclusion of the matters at present before them, as well concerning the raifing of Moneys, and the new Leavies ; as the advancement of the Prince of. Orange; This day they are adjourned till the fifth of *Hanuary*, though in the interim, they have appointed their Deputies to meet, in order to the bringing the feveral matters to a Head, to be presented to them at their next Assembly ; The Councel of State is likewife, as we are told, employed about framing a new State of the War, to be gi-ven in to the States General. The Rhyngrave ispreparing for his departure towards our Frontiers on the Khyn, where it is faid, he is to command the Forces of this State.

feeing there are no Commissions as yet given out to that purpose, it being thought, that the States will first expect to hear from their Minister the Heer d' Amerongen at Cologne, in what posture the af-fairs of that place are, and what appearance these feems to be of an accommodation; all our Lettersfrom thencetell us, that as well the Imperial Com-millioners, as the Deputies of the Circle of Weffphalia, to whom fome likewife joyn the Bifhop of Munster , have by their constant endeavors , given fufficient proof of their good intentions to ferve the-Town in this affair, in which they have notwithftanding, been fo far unfuccesful, that all the Projects and Proposals they have of late framed, have onely made way for new Objections, and left them at prefent almost as far from concluding on any thing, as they were at their first coming thither.

Bruffels; Decemb. 29. The 20 inftant arrived here an Express from the Hague, with Letters from the Spanish Envoy there, Don Emanuel de Lyra, to the Count de Monterey, whereupon his Excellency immediately dispatched an Extraordinary Courrier to the Court at Madrid, to give her Majefty an account of what, according to his advice from thence, had passed between the laid Spanish Minister, and the Deputies of the States General at the Hugue ; The 2 B his Excellency went hence for *Malines*, to be pre-fent at the caffing of feveral pieces of Canon there, and this Bvening returned again, having received advice, that the Express which he had sent some days. fince to Spaine, had been fet upon near Peronne, and all his Letters taken from him. On Tuesday laft went hence 150 Reformed Officers for Gelderland, under the Command of Don Miguel Suaue, an old experienced Commander.

London, Dec. 20.
