Madrid, March 26, N. S.

**O**N the 10th Instant Mademoiselle de Beaujolois set out for France, accompanied by a Lady of Honour and two Waiting-Women, and attended by some Yeomen of the Guard; and as soon as she overtakes the young Queen Widow her Sister, she is to be delivered into her Majesty's Care. On the 4th of next Month their Catholick Majesties leave this Place, to go to reside at Aranjuez till the Middle of June. A Courier from St. Ander in Biscay has brought an Account, that two Spanish Men of War of 60 Guns each newly built there, are sailed from thence for the Port of Cadiz, to serve in the Squadron appointed for this Year in the Mediterranean.

*Paris, April 7, N. S.* On the 5th of this Month the Infanta of Spain set out from Versailles to return to Madrid. The King has appointed the Dutchess of Tallard to accompany that Princess to the Frontier; and his Majesty has ordered she shall be attended in the Journey by the like Number of Troops and of Officers of his Household, as were sent to meet her when she came into France. The King has likewise given Directions, that the same Honours shall be paid to the Infanta, in all the Towns through which she passes, as were at her coming hither. The Marshal de Tessé, who returned some Days ago from his Embassy at the Court of Spain, went to Marly the 2d Instant, and was very graciously received by the King, who on the 4th set out from Marly for Rambouillet.
