**H**IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne, with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Sanderson, Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for Redemung the Annuities of Twenty Five Thousand Pounds per Annum charged on the Civil List Revenues, by an Act of the Seventh Year of His Majesty's Reign, and for discharging the Debts and Arrears due from His Majesty to His Servants, Tradesmen, and others.

An Act for Regulating Elections within the City of London, and for preserving the Peace, good Order, and Government of the said City.

An Act for making more effectual An Act passed in the Parliament holden in the 12th Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, Entituled An Act for making the River Nine or Nens running from Northampton to Peterborough, Navigable.

An Act for Repairing and Amending the Road from Biggleswade, in the County of Bedford, to Bugden, and through Alconberry to the Top of Alconberry Hill, or Cross-Roads, leading into Sauntry-Lane, on the York and Edinburgh Road, and from the said Town of Bugden to the Town of Huntingdon, and from Cross Hall in Eaton Sokon, in the said County of Bedford, to Great Stoughton-Common, in the said County of Huntingdon.

An Act for settling the Estates of the most Noble Writchesly Luke of Bedford on his Marriage with the Right Honourable the Lady Anne Egerton, Daughter of the most Noble Scroop Luke of Bridgewater.

An Act to enable Edmund Duke of Buckinghamshire and Normanby to make Leases (with the Consens of his Guardian and Trustees) of the Mannors, Lands, and Estate therein mentioned.

An Act for Vesting the Estates of the most Noble Henry Duke of Kent, in the Counties of Hereford, Monmouth, and Gloucester, in the said Duke and his Heirs, and for settling his other Estates in the Counties of Essex, Suffolk, Bedford, Hertford, Northampton and Leicester in lieu thereof.

And to eight other private Bills.

Whereas His Majesty's Exchequer was broke open between Midday Noon and thir Morning, and a considerable Sum of Money was taken out of the Office of the Right Honourable the Lord William Roubles & This is to give Notice, That if any Person concerned in the said Felony, or being any ways privy thereto, by advising or contriving the same, will surrender himself and make a free Discovery of his Accomplices or Accomplices, so as they or any one of them shall be apprehended and convicted for the same, such Person, whether concerned in the said Felony, or in advising, contriving or being privy thereto, shall have His Majesty's most gracious Pardon; and as a further Encouragement shall have a Reward of One Thousand Pounds, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury. And if any other Person or Persons shall discover, apprehend, and convict any Person or Persons concerned in the said Felony, he or they shall receive the like Reward of One Thousand Pounds, to be paid in like Manner.
