Madrid, June 4. N. S.

ON the 28th past their Catholick Majesties went from Aranjuez to Guadalaxara to receive the Infanta, who arrived there that Evening. The next Day in the Afternoon their Majesties with the Infanta made their Entry into Madrid. When they came to the Gate of Alcala, the Mayor and Magistrates of this Town all on Horseback with a great Retinue of the Officers of Justice, after having complimented their Majesties upon the safe Arrival of the Infanta, went before their Coaches and conducted them to the Palace through three triumphal Arches which had been erected at certain distances in the Town. A little after, the Comedians appeared in the Square before the Palace, some on Horseback and others on a Triumphal Carr, and having mounted a Stage built under the King's Balcony they acted a Play and danced several Antick Dances; at Night there were Fire-Works let off, and Bonfires, and Illuminations all over the Town. It has been published here by the King of Spain's Order, that on the 26th of July next, being the Day of the Infanta's Name, there will be a Bull-Feast in the Plaza-Mayor of this Town; for which purpose the necessary Preparations are making with all Speed.

This Morning between Two and Three a-Clock, arrived a Messenger dispatched by the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Townshend Principal Secretary of State attending His Majesty, with a Letter dated off Helvoetsluys Monday Morning the 7th of June at Seven a-Clock, giving an Account, that His Majesty was (God be thanked) safely arrived there, and going up the Maes with a fair Wind and Tide for 'sGravendael, where His Majesty was to go on Board the States Yacht, in order to proceed on His Journey to Hanover.

This Evening the Lords Justices met and opened their Commission: Their Excellencies have been pleased to appoint Charles Delafaye, Esq; to be their Secretary.
