The following Address from the Council and Assembly of South-Carolina has been delivered to His Grace the Duke of Newcastle one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by Francis Young, Esq; Agent of the said Province, in order to be presented to His Majesty.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Council and Assembly of South-Carolina

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Council and Assembly of this your Majesty's Province, pray Leave to congratulate your Majesty upon the happy Situation of your Affairs both at Home and Abroad, and to assure you, that with others of your Majesty's loyal Subjects, we in particular in this your Province, cannot but be sensibly touched with the good Effects arising from a continued Peace in Europe; and we most humbly beg Leave to approach your Sacred Majesty with our sincere and hearty Congratulations on the late happy Addition it has pleased God to make to your Majesty's illustrious Family; and if our Joy on this Occasion could admit of any Abatement, it would arise from the Consideration of the Distance we are from your Sacred Person, which renders us unable of performing our Duty to your Majesty so early as those who have the Happiness to live under your Majesty's more immediate and auspicious Influence

In this Particular only we think ourselves unfortunate, while we should be wanting in the Duty we owe to the best of Kings, did we not acknowledge the many and great Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's glorious Administration in common with the rest of our Fellow-Subjects remote from the Throne.

The many Instances we have had of this induce us humbly to hope, that your Majesty will always lend a favourable Ear to, and take into your Majesty's Royal Consideration, such Petitions and Representations from us as are consistent with your Majesty's great Goodness to grant; and since the Affairs of his Excellency Francis Nicholson, Esq; our Governour, has obliged him to desire Leave of Absence from us for some Time, which we ardently wish may not be long, we cannot but think ourselves still happy, tho' we are constrained to part with a Governour who has nothing more in View than the Publick Good of this your Majesty's Province, in that he has taken Care so discreetly, according to your Majesty's Royal Commission and Instructions, to supply his Place by the Honourable Arthur Middleton, Esq; a Gentleman thoroughly acquainted with the Constitution of this Country, and every way else fitted for that high and honourable Station.

That your Majesty may long continue thus a Blessing to your Subjects both at Home and Abroad, and at last receive an eternal and glorious Reward, are the sincere Prayers of,
