ON the 6th Instant, about Eight in the Evening, the Queen of Prussia arrived at Herrenhausen, and was received by His Majesty with the greatest Marks of Tenderness and Affection; her Majesty is attended here by the Count de Dohna Chamberlain, M. de Steinberg Councillour at War and Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, and one of the Sons of the Count d'Ohnhausen, as also by several Ladies of Distinction of this Court, besides those she brought with her, who are the Countess de Finkenstein, Mademoiselle de Grumkau, and Mademoiselle de Bulau. M. de Brancas Minister from the most Christian King to the Court of Sweden came hither lately, and set forward this Morning for Stockholm. M. le Coq Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Poland, is also come hither from Dresden, and Baron Sparre Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden from Stockholm. On the 11th in the Evening, His Majesty, the Queen of Prussia, Prince Frederick and his Highness the Duke of York came from Herrenhausen to the Palace in this Town, where a French Tragedy was acted, and afterwards there was a fine Consort of Musick, and last of all a very entertaining Farce: In a few Days there will be a Ball in the Orangerie in Herrenhausen Gardens for the Diversion of her Prussian Majesty, who intends to stay at this Court about a Week or 10 Days longer.

Versailles, Aug. 25, N. S. The Commandeur de Conflans, first Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to the Duke of Orleans, arrived here on the 18th Instant from Strasbourg, to give the King an Account, that on the 15th in the Morning the Cardinal de Rohan, Great Almoner of France, performed the Ceremony of Marrying the Duke of Orleans, as Proxy for his Majesty, to the Princess Mary, in the Cathedral of Strasbourg; King Stanislaus and his Consort, and the Duke d'Antin with the Marquess de Beauvau his most Christian Majesty's Ambassadors, being present. On the 20th at Night the Duke d'Epemon, Grandson of the Duke d'Antin, arrived, with Advice, that the Queen set out from Strasbourg on the 17th. On the 18th the King took a Review of the two Troops of Mousquetaires, in the Park of Chaville: His Majesty rode through the Ranks, and saw them file off. On the 21st his Majesty set out from hence for Fontainebleau; where the Queen is expected the 6th of next Month.
