ON the 1st Instant in the Evening their Catholick Majesties with the Infantes went in great Pomp to the Church of our Lady de Atocha, to give Thanks for the late Conclusion and Ratification of the Peace between the Emperour and Spain. All the Streets through which they passed were hung with rich Tapestry, and as they came back the Streets and Plaza Mayor were finely illuminated with White Wax Flambeaux. After their Return to the Palace, Fireworks were let off in the great Palace Yard. The Beginning of this Month, the Count de Aranda and the Marquess d'Aterez, both of the Prime Nobility of Arragon, who for some Time past had retired here, were ordered by the President of Castile, in his Catholick Majesty's Name, to retire immediately from hence to their Estates, which accordingly they did. On the 2d Instant in the Afternoon, their Catholick Majesties viewed from their Balcony in the Palace-Yard three Squadrons of Horse-Guards which are ordered to Catalonia; and after they had withdrawn, the Regiment of Dragoons called Terragona, consisting of 400 Men (which passed by here on their March to Arragon) was reviewed in the Palace-Yard: They were very well mounted and accoutered, and performed all their Exercise, both on Foot and Horseback. On the 3d their Catholick Majesties went to the Escorial, where they design to stay till the End of this Month. The Marquess de Castelar Secretary at War, and the Marquess de la Paz Secretary of the Finances, have followed his Catholick Majesty thither. His Catholick Majesty has been pleased to create the Marquess de Valero President of the Council of the Indies, a Grandee of the first Class; and Donna Maria de Nieves, Lady of Honour to the Infanta and very much in Favour with the Queen, is created a Countess of Castile. Don Francisco Ariaza Medina, Councellour of the Finances, has been named by his Catholick Majesty President of the Council of Finances, in the Room of the Marquess de Campo-florido, with half of the Salary allotted to that Employment; the other half remaining to the Marquess de Campo-florido, who by reason of his Infirmities is not able to discharge the Functions of that Office. The Marquess de Grimaldo, Councellour and Secretary of State, is recovered of his late Illness. The Prince of Cellamare, Master of the Horse to the Queen of Spain, and Brother of the Cardinal del Giudice, is to set out in a few Days for Rome, having obtained Leave to make that Journey in order to see his Relations there: He intends to go by Land through France by the Way of Provence. The last Letters from Barcelona bring an Account, that on the 1st Instant there was a Meeting upon the Frontiers between M. de Firmarçon the commanding Officer of the French Troops there, and M. Duwan commanding the Spanish Troops, in relation to Deserters and some Bands of Robbers which infest those

Countries; and that in the said Meeting they agreed upon several Articles to be observed for remedying the Mischiefs arising from Desertion and Robbing.
