Paris, September 5, N. S.

THE Cardinal de Rohan arrived here the 28th past from Strasbourg, and on the 30th proceeded to Fontainebleau. Bread being very dear at present, the Parliament of Paris have caused an Arrêt to be published, ordering that from the 27th of August last (the Date of that Arrêt) the Allowance for Viſtuals to Prisoners for Debt should be increased from five to seven Sols a Day to each Prisoner, to be paid by their Creditors, who are commanded by the said Arrêt to advance one Month's Allowance. The King has been pleased to promote M. Herault, Intendant of Tours, to the Office of Lieutenant-General de Police of this City, in the Room of M. d'Ombreval, who is made Intendant of Tours, and has a Pension of 6000 Livres settled on him by his Majesty. The said new Intendant has sent circular Orders into the Country, round this Place, for the regular supplying of the Markets from time to time with Bread-Corn, and for preventing the concealing of Corn in private Granaries M. Lambert being nominated by his Majesty to be Prevost des Merchands of this City, in the Room of M. de Chateaufeuf, the other City-Magistrates assembled on the 27th past, and chose him into that Office. An Ordinance by the King in Council has been published, by which his Majesty's Guard of an Hundred Swifs are forbidden to sell Wine or any other Liguors, or to lodge in any House where the same is sold, on the Penalty of a Fine, six Months Imprisonment, and of being cashiered. By the same Ordinance the Pay of the said Hundred Swifs is increased from 14 to 20 Sols a Day. The Parliament are about to chuse a Deputation of 60 Persons from among themselves, to go to Fontainebleau, and make their Compliments to the King on his Marriage.

Whereas some few Invalid Out-Personers belonging to the Royal Hospital at Chelsea are unpaid on several Warrants from the 25th of June 1722, to the 24th of December 1723: This is therefore to give Notice, that if neither then selves, Executors, or Assignees, do appear at the Pay Office in the said Hospital, to make out their Demands on or before the 29th of September 1725. they will be for ever excluded from receiving the same.
