N the 10th Instant the Deputies of the Assembly General of the Clergy of France were introduced to the King with the were introduced to the King with the usual Ceremonies, and by the Mouth of the Bishop of Luçon made their Compliments to his Majesty on his Marriage. The same Day they had Audience of the Queen, and the Bishop of Angers speaking for the rest, made their Compliments to her Majesty. That Day the Keeper of the Seals of France, at the Head of the Council, complimented their Majesties. And the following Days the like Duty was paid by the Defollowing Days the like Duty was paid by the Deputies of the Parliament, the Deputies of the Chamber of Accompts, of the Court of Aids, of the Great Council, and of the Court of the Mint: The President of each Company making their Speeches severally. The Deputies of the University, and of the French Academy, having likewife been introduced with the usual Ceremonies to their Majesties, made their Compliments in Speeches pronounced by the Heads of each of those Societies. On the 16th our City Magistrates, the Duke de Gesvres Governour of Paris being at their Head, were introduced to the King and Queen severally, and the President Lambert Prevost des Marchands, made their Compliments. The Duke de Gramont, Peer and Marshal of France, whose chief Employments were those of Governour and Lieutenant-General for the King in Navarre and Bearn, and Collonel of the French Guards, died at Paris the 16th Instant. He is succeeded as Collonel of the French Guards by his Son the Marqueis de Souvigay.

Dublin, Sipt. 7. This Day the Parliament of this Kingdom met, according to their last Prorogation. In the House of Peers the Lord Chancellour took the Oaths and his Place as Speaker;

and several Lords, Spiritual and Temporal, who were introduced and sat the first Time in Parliament, took the Oaths The Commons credered their Speaker to issue his Warrants to the Clerk of the Crown, to make out Writs for enting several Knights of Shires and Burgesses for Boroughs, in the Room of some Members called up to the House of Peers, and of others deceased. And both Houses adjourned to this Day Fortnight the 21st Instant.
