N the 26th paft his Catholick Majefty performed the Ceremony of delivering to the Duke del Arco his Master of the and to the Marquess de Santa Cruz the Duke del Arco his Mafter of the Horfe, and to the Marquefs de Santa Cruz Lord Chamberlain to the Queen of Spain, the blue Ribbons and Badges of the French Order of the Holy Ghoft; they being two Knights of the Promotion which his moft Chriftian Ma-jefty made the Beginning of this Year. His Ca-tholick Majefty has fent Orders to the Marquefs de St. Phelippe, his Minifter at Genoa, to repair immediately to the Hague, and to ferve there as his Minifter to the States General, and in his Room has been pleafed to appoint Don Bernardo de Efpeletta (lately his Catholick Ma-jefty's Secretary of the Embaffy in England) who is preparing to fet out for Italy in a few Days. The Marquefs de Grimaldo, his Catho-lick Majefty's Counfellour and Secretary of State, lick Majefty's Counfellour and Secretary of State, having gone through with the taking of Re-medies for the Recovery of his Health, fet out for St. Ildefonfo on the 6th Inftant, where he arrived the Day following, and has fince begun to transact the Affairs belonging to his Office. The Marquefs de Castelar, Secretary at War, who waited upon their Catholick Majeflies to St. Ildefonfo, has been taken very ill of a Fe-ver at Balfain, (half a League from the Court,) where he has his Office. It is faid that his Catholick Majefly, upon the repeated Inflances made by the Contractation-House and the Traders of Seville, has at last determined, that the Commerce, which is now carried on by the Way of Cadiz to the West-Indies, shall be re-establifhed at Seville upon the Foot it was in former Times. Letters from Mequinez bring an Account,

that the Father Guardian of the Spanish Convent of Capuchins near the faid Town, being very much in Favour with the Emperour of Morocco, is turned Mahometan, and has married a Moorith Woman. Letters from Cadiz of the 4th Inftant advife, that a Mufcovite Man of War of 54 Guns and two Frigates of 24 Guns each, are arrived there with Ladings of Naval Stores, Wax, Linnen, Leather, and a fmall Quantity of Arms, and Iron Cannon, in purfuance of his Catholick Majefly's Permiflion for their Admittance granted two Years ago, in order to make a Tryal of the Mufcovite Trade to these Countries, and to regulate a Treaty of Commerce upon it. In the mean time the faid Goods are to pay 10 per Cent Duties at their firft Entrance : The faid Ships came configned to Leon Semenicoff a Mufcovite Merchant lately fettled there, under the Direction of Conful Jacob Euwzeinoff.

On the 22d Infrant the Lord Waldgrave, Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to the King of Great Britain, being charged with the Compliments of the King his Mafter and of his Royal Highnels the Prince of Wales, to their most Christian Majesties on their Marriage; had his feveral Audiences for that Purpofe. Between 11 and 12 in the Morning his Lordship was introduced by his Excellency Mr Horatio Walpole the British Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the King in his Closet, and delivered his Credential from his Britannick Majesty, in whose Name he made a Compliment fuitable to the Occasion, as he did also in the Name of his Royal Highnels the Prince of Wales: Which his most Christian Majesty received with Expressions of the greatest Satisfastion. There were present in the King's Closet, the Duke of Bourbon, the Bishop of Frejus, and the Count de Morville.

His Lordhip's Audience of the Queen was appointed for the Afternoon, when at Three he repaired with the Ambassadour to Court, and was by his Excellency introduced to her Majefty in her Clofet. His Lordfhip made a Compliment to her in the King's Name, and also his Royal Highnels the Prince's Compliment; and her Majefty expressed great Satisfaction at the Regard shewn to her. Though this Audience was underftood to be a private one, the Doors were all open, and feveral Princeffes of the Blood, with a great many Ladies whole Employments or Quality gave them Admittance to her-Majefty, were prefent. The Count de Morville, and the Bifhop of Frejus, were also prefent at this Audience; which was defigned as a Mark of Respect to the Meffage his Lordfhip came with.
