Lisbon, October 14, N. S.

THE Marriages of the Prince of Brazil with the Infanta of Castile, and of the Prince of Asturias with the Infanta of Portugal, were declared here the 9th Instant, upon which Occasion Te Deum was sung in the Patriarchal Church, the Patriarch officiating, their Portuguese Majesties with the Royal Family being present; and their Majesties returning to the Palace received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction. Illuminations and other Publick Rejoycings were ordered throughout this City the three succeeding Days.

Paris, Oct. 22, N. S. King Stanislaus, with the Queen his Consort, who set out from Strasbourg the 22d of last Month, in order to come to the Royal Seat of Chambord where they are to reside, arrived at Bouron near Fontainebleau the 15th Instant. The same Day the Queen, accompanied by Mademoiselle de Clermont Princess of the Blood, with the Ladies and principal Officers of her Court, went to Bouron to see King Stanislaus and his Queen; and on the 16th his most Christian Majesty went thither to make them a Visit: On the 19th they set out from thence for Chambord. The Electoral Prince of Bavaria, with his Brothers the Elector of Cologne, Duke Ferdinand, and the Bishop of Ratisbon, who have been incognito here and at Court since the Beginning of last Month, have taken Leave of the King and Queen, in order to their Departure.

Hagus, Oct. 26, N. S. Yesterday the States of the Province of Holland adjourned their Assembly to next Month, after having had several Conferences with the States General about the Opposition made by the Zealanders to the Collection of the Tarif or new Duties on Goods imported or exported: The Result of which Conferences is, that their High Mightinesses have passed a Reso-

lution to cause necessary Measures to be taken for putting the said Tarif in Execution. Count de Pefch, with two Commissioners appointed by the States of Holland, set out from hence the Instant with a Detachment of Troops, to Possession of the Lordship of Vianen, and to receive Homage from the Inhabitants in the 12 of the said States. The Electoral Prince of Bavaria, and Duke Ferdinand his Brother, are daily expected here from Paris. Count Konigseck, the Emperour's Minister, is not yet arrived.

Gubre, Oct. 11, O. S. This Morning between Seven and Eight a-Clock His Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Frederick went a Hunting, and did not return till Four in the Afternoon. The Weather has been very fine ever since the King's Arrival here.

General Post-Office, Oct. 7, 1725.

Whereas upon a strict Examination of the Riders together with the Circumstances, which are since found to agree with his Relation, it does appear that the Cross-Road Mail which constantly goes between Chester and Exeter, was really taken away from the Rider upon Sunday the 26th of September last, about Three a-Clock in the Morning, by two Men on Horseback, near Pensford, a Village about seven Miles from Bristol, in the Road to Wells, who carried off the entire Mail, which had in it the Bags of Letters of the several Towns of Chester, Whitchurch, Shrewsbury, Bridgnorth, Bewdley, Kidderminster, Worcester, Tewksbury, Gloucester, Wotton-Under-ridge, Bristol, Wells, Bridgwater, Taunton, Wellington, Twerton and Exeter; and Expresses having been immediately, the very same Morning, sent away from Bristol to Chester and Exeter, to give Notice of the Accident to the several Post-Towns mentioned, and their Dependancies, and no Notice having been as yet sent to the General Post-Office at London, of any Bank Notes, or other Notes, or Bills, that were in the said Mail, with Endorsements upon them, according to the Method proposed in the Advertisement so long published in the Prints, it is to be presumed that there were no such Notes, or Bills
