Paris, October 29, N. S.

ON the 17th Instant the General Assembly of the Clergy here received a Letter from the King, commanding them to conclude their Sessions that Day, and forbidding them to hold any other for deliberating upon any Church Affair, whether relating to the Bull Unigenitus or to any other Subject of Controversy, on Pain of incurring his Majesty's Displeasure in Case of Disobedience. And by the same Letter, the Prelates who compose that Assembly, were ordered to retire forthwith to their respective Dioceses. The said Assembly was desirous to continue their Sessions, under Pretence of censuring some Propositions, and of settling certain Points of Doctrine; and it was apprehended such Acts of theirs would in the Consequences have inflamed the present Divisions and created new Disputes to the Disturbance of the publick Quiet; wherefore the King thought fit by his Letter to order them to separate. King Stanislaus went from Bouron to Bellegarde, a Seat of the Duke d'Antin's, and having passed some Days there, he proceeded to Chambord, where he arrived on the 24th. It is said the King and Queen will leave Fontainebleau the 28th Instant, pass two Days at Petit Bourg, and arrive at Versailles the 1st of December. The Merchants of Paris and of the other principal Cities of the Kingdom, have lately presented a Petition to the King, desiring his Majesty either to settle a-new in an irrevocable Manner the India Company, or to restore the Freedom of Commerce as before that Company was erected.

minster, Worcester, Tewksbury, Gloucester, Wotten-Underidge, Bristol, Wells, Bridgewater, Taunton, Wellington, Truro and Exeter; and Expresses having been immediately, the very same Morning, sent away from Bristol to Chester and Exeter, to give Notice of the Accident to the several Post Towns mentioned, and their Dependents, and no Notice having been as yet sent to the General Post-Office at London, of any Bank Notes, or other Notes, or Bills, that were in the said Mail, with Endorsements upon them, according to the Method proposed in the Advertisement so long published in the Prints, it is to be presumed that there were no such Notes, or Bills in the said Mail.
