**G**eneral Hompefch is returned hither with the Detachment of Troops that had been sent to Vianen, which Lordship is now in the Possession of the States of the Province of Holland. The Electoral Prince of Bavaria, and his Brother Duke Ferdinand, arrived here on the 9th Instant, and this Morning set out for Amsterdam, thence to proceed to Germany. They were last Night at a Ball and Supper given by the French Ambassadour on Occasion of the King his Master's Marriage; which he would have celebrated sooner, had not his Lady fallen ill of the Small-Pox, of which she is now recovered. Most of the Members of the States of Holland are arrived here, in order to open their Assembly To-Morrow. M. Hop, Envoy from the States General to His Britannick Majesty, having desired Leave to come hither on Occasion of the Death of the late Treasurer his Father, their High Mightinesses Leave was sent to him this Morning. His Brother is likewise to set out from Paris the 15th Instant to return hither. The Count de Tarouca having received Orders from the Court of Lisbon to repair to that of Vienna, is preparing to begin his Journey thither about a Fortnight hence.

Gohze, Oct, 28, O. S. Yesterday the King had very good Sport a Hunting, and killed three Stags. In the Evening was celebrated the Feast of St. Hubert, famous among Hunters. After Supper his Highness Prince Frederick, and the chief of the Gentlemen and Ladies of the Court, danced before the King two or three Hours. The Lord Waldgrave, who was sent by His Majesty to compliment the most Christian King upon his Marriage, arrived here this Morning from Paris, and immediately waited on His Majesty, who received him very graciously.
