**T**HE 22d past being the Birth-Day of the King of Portugal, his Majesty received the Compliments of the Nobility and Foreign Ministers, who were admitted to kiss his Hand. In the Evening His Majesty went to pay his Devotions at the Image of the Virgin a small Distance from this City, according to his Custom on that Day; and at his Return gave Audience to the Royal Academy, their President the Marquess de Fronteira making a very eloquent Speech upon the Occasion. The Duke of Cadaval, who was obliged to go to the Baths some Weeks ago on Account of his Health, is returned very much recovered. The Dutch Admiral Sommelsdyck is sailed with his Squadron, in order to cruize betwixt this Place and the Streights.

Gabre, Nov. 4, O. S. The King has been our frequently a Hunting last Week and this, and designs to go out again on Saturday next; the Weather continuing very fine for that Diversion. This Morn'g His Majesty was pleased to declare Thursday next the 11th Instant, O. S. to be the Day for His Departure from hence for Hanover, and to direct the proper Officers to make the necessary Preparations against that Day. The Duke and Dutchess of Blanckenbourg design to go from hence on Wednesday next the 10th Instant.

Dublin, Nov. 1. Saturday last being the Anniversary of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales's Birth-Day, there was a great Appearance of the Nobility and Gentry at the Castle to pay their Compliments to the Lord Lieutenant: At Noon the great Guns fired at the Barracks, which were answered by Volleys from the Regiments upon Duty: In the Evening there was a Play given by his Excellency for the Entertainment of the Ladies, and afterwards a Ball at the Castle; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and the usual Demonstrations of Joy. On the 27th past the Lord Lieutenant communicated to the House of Commons, His Majesty's most Gracious Answer to their Address at the Opening of this Session, which Answer is as follows.

Whereupon the House attended his Excellency on the 30th, with the following Address of Thanks to His Majesty.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,  
The humble Address of the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, beg Leave to return our most unfeigned Thanks, for your Majesty's most gracious Answer to our Address.

The Security, Ease, and Happiness which your Majesty's constant Care has effectually procured for your Subjects of this Kingdom, convince us more and more, that we owe entirely to your Majesty, not only the Preservation of our Religious and Civil Rights, but the uninterrupted Possession and Enjoyment of them; and we are fully persuaded, that we can never shew ourselves truly sensible of these inestimable Blessings, but by supporting your Majesty, and the Honour of your Government, to the utmost of our Power; and endeavouring, by our dutiful Behaviour, to make your Reign as easy to your Majesty, as it has been Happy and Mild to your People.

To which his Excellency was pleased to return the Answer following.
