The States of the Province of Guelderland having had communicated to them the Remonstrance lately made by those of Holland, on the Necessity of re-establishing the Affairs of this Republick, have drawn up a vigorous Representation to induce the other Provinces to enter into all proper Measures for that Purpose. M. Boreel is come hither from Zealand, and is preparing to fet out forthwith for the Court of France, M. Hop being expected from Paris in two or three Days. M. Kalkoen, who is appointed Ambassadour to Constantinople, is likewise here at present, to endeavour while the States of Holland are affembled to get the Sum fettled that is to be allowed him for the Charges of his Journey and Embassy, he being the first Minister that has gone from this State to the Ottoman Port with the Character of Ambassadour. M. Linden, Governour of the young Prince of Nassau Friseland, is arrived here, and has taken his Seat in the Assembly of the States General, on the Part of the Nobles of the District of Nimeguen, being chosen their President in the Room of M. Rantwyck lately deceased. M. de Bleskensgraef, one of the Representatives of Holland in that Assembly, died here this Morning.
