#### Madrid, November 5, N.S.

HREE Days ago the Duke of Popoli, a Neapolitan Nobleman, fet out for Italy, in order ('tis faid) to raife there a Regiment of Italian Foot-Guards for the King of Spain's Ser-vice, and ro bring them hither. Their Catholick Majesties still remain at the Escurial. Yesterday arrived here the Count de Oropesa from Vi-enna, in order to take Possession of his great Eftate, which was confilcated upon his following the Emperour's Party in the late Wars, and is now reitored to him, in Purfuance of the Peace lately concluded between Spain and the Emperour. Part of Count Konigfeck's Equipage is arrived. and it is thought he will be here by the End of

this Month, being to come by the Bill of Higus, Nov. 20, N.S. The States of the Pro-Vince of Holland began their Seffion the 14th Inftant. On the 15th they disposed of the Employment of Counfellour in the Court of Holland, (which became vacant by the Promotion of M. Ten Hove to that of Secretary of the Council of State) in Favour of M. Schaep; and have fince been chiefly employed in filling up the Offices Civil and Military that were vacant in their Repartition. Prince Kourakin, who was the Muf-covite Ambaffadour to the States General, has taken Leave of their High Mightineffes in Form, by a Memorial which he caufed to be prefented to them with his Letters of Revocation: And their High Mightineffes have fent him his Recre-dentials, with the ufual Prefent, which is a Me-dal and Gold Chain of the Value of 6000 Florins. The States of the Province of Guelderland having had communicated to them the Remon-firance lately made by those of Holland, on the Neceflity of re-eftablishing the Affairs of this Republick, have drawn up a vigorous Representation to induce the other Provinces to enter into all proper Measures for that Purpole. M. Boreel is come hither from Zealand, and is preparing to fet out forthwith for the Court of France, M. Hop being expected from Paris in two or three Days. M Kalkoen, who is appointed Ambassadour to Constantinople, is likewise here at present, to endeavour while the States of Holland are assembled to get the Sum fettled that is to be allowed him for the Charges of his Journey and Embally, he being the first Minister that has gone from this State to the Ottoman Port with the Character of Ambaffadour. M. Linden, Governour of the young Prince of Naflau Frideland, is arrived here, and has taken his Seat in the Affembly of the States General, on the Part of the Nobles of the Diftrift of Nimeguen, being chofen their Prefi-dent in the Room of M. Rantwyck lately de-ceafed. M. de Bleskenfgraef, one of the Reprefen-tatives of Holland in that Affembly, died here this Morning.

Gobre, Nov. 8, O. S. The King continues His Refolution of letting out from hence for Hanover on Thursday next early in the Morning, and Preparations are made for that Purpole. His Ma-jefly defigns to hunt To-morrow for the laft Time.
