ON the 28th of last Month, the King and Queen left Fontainebleau and came that Evening to the Duke of Antin's Seat at Petit Bourg. His Majesty has conferred the Government of the Town and Principality of Sedan, on the Marquess de Coigny, Knight of the King's Orders, Lieutenant General of his Forces; and Colonel General of the Dragoons of France. The Abbot de Briffac, Brother of the Duke of that Name, is made Almoner to the King, in the Room of the Abbot Milon who is nominated to the vacant Bishoprick of Valence.

Brussels, Nov. 28, N. S. On the 24th Instant Field-Marshal Count Daun, late Governour General of the Austrian Netherlands, took his Leave of the Archdutchess Governess after a long Conference. The next Morning his Excellency with his Lady set out from hence attended by a Detachment of Dragoons, and went to Louvain, where the Cannon on the Ramparts fired as he passed through the Town; the Archdutchess's Presence here, prevented this City's paying him that Honour. His Excellency was attended to Tirlemont by the Detachment, and accompanied by a great Number of the Nobility of both Sexes, who took their Leaves of him and his Lady, after having been magnificently entertained there by them. It is the Talk here, that he will in a short Time be succeeded in the Government of Milan (to which he is now going) by the Archdutchess Mary Magdalen, as he was in this Government by the Archdutchess Mary Elizabeth. His Administration in these Provinces was such, as gained him the general Esteem and Affection of the Nobility and People. The Count de Kunighley, Envoy from the Duke of Lorraine, had a private Audience some Days ago of the Archdutchess. The Marquess de Sars de Bournonville being made Governour of Dendermonde, and being obliged for qualifying himself for that Employment to take an Oath to the States General as well as to the Emperour, M. Pesters their High Mightinesses Resident here, is authorized by them to administer that Oath to him.
