Stockholm, November 11, O. S.

SOME Swedish Merchants having the last Summer obtained the requisite Authorities from hence to entitle them to fetch some Part of the Corn which by the 6th Article of the Treaty of Neustadt the Swedes have a Right to export from Revel, Riga, or Arensburg Custom-free, they accordingly bought up a good Quantity on that Account, but could not however ship it all off before a general Prohibition of exporting Corn was lately published at those Ports: And tho' the Swedish Ministers at Petersbourg have insisted that the said Corn ought to be allowed to be exported, as having been bought on Account of that particular Privilege, granted by the said Treaty before the Prohibition was made, yet the Russian Court hath positively refused to suffer the Exportation thereof, by which Means the Swedes being obliged to sell it there again, must suffer considerable Loss. About ten Days ago young Count Tessin set out from hence by the Way of Pomerania, to go and reside as Envoy Extraordinary from this Crown at the Court of Vienna; and we have Advice, that Count Freytag, the Imperial Envoy to this Court, has received Orders to return hither. Major-General Alderfeldt, the Swedish Envoy at the Court of Denmark, being recalled, is expected shortly from Copenhagen.

Madrid, Nov. 19, N. S. His Catholick Majesty has been pleased to honour Sig. Lawless, late Ambassadour of Spain at Paris, with the Title of Captain General of Majorca, of which he was only Governour, and has granted him the Pay of 12000 Ducats a Year. This being the Festival of St Elizabeth, whose Name the Queen of Spain bears, most of the Grandees and Nobility made their Appearance at Court at the Escorial, where they paid their Compliments to her Majesty, and had the Honour to kiss her Hand.

Paris, Dec. 7. On the 1st Instant in the Evening, the King and Queen arrived at Versailles from Petit-Bourg. On the 4th Prince Kourakin, Ambassadour Extraordinary from the Czarina, had a private Audience of the King. The same Day the Dutchess Dowager of Orleans, and the Dutchess of Orleans, went to Versailles, with their respective Equipages and Retinues, and were received by the King and Queen with all Marks of Esteem and Favour. The Queen Dowager of Spain is to pass through this City the 15th Instant, to make a Visit to their Majesties at Versailles. M. Bignon, Counsellour of State and Prevôt des Merchands of this City, died the 5th Instant in the 68th Year of his Age: His Brother the Abbot de Bignon, the King's Librarian, is much indisposed.

Hague, Dec. 7, N. S. The Great Pensionary is so well recovered of his late Indisposition, that it is believed he will be able to assist at the next Assembly of the States of the Province of Holland, which is to be held on the 12th Instant. M. Hop, late Ambassadour from the States General to the Court of France, set out Yesterday from hence for Amsterdam, where he is to marry M. Kalkoen's Daughter, Sister to the Gentleman of that Name who is nominated to go Ambassadour to Constantinople. Major-General Wertmuller died some Days ago at Namur, by which the Command of a Swiss Regiment in the Service of this State, furnished by the Canton of Zurich, is become vacant. The Yachts and Convoy appointed to receive his Britannick Majesty on his Return to England, arrived at Helvoersluys the 3d Instant; and Yesterday Sir John Norris, with some Officers, took a Turn hither.
