A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas this present Parliament stands Prorogued to the Sixteenth Day of this Instant December, We, with the Advice of His Majesty's Privy-Council, do hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued on the said Sixteenth Day of December, to Thursday the Twentieth Day of January next; And that we have given Order, that a Commission be prepared for Proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further Declare His Majesty's Pleasure, That the said Parliament shall, on the said Twentieth Day of January, be Held, and Sit for the Dispatch of divers Weighty and Important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners of Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby Required and Comanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster, on Thursday the Twentieth Day of January next.

Madrid, Nov. 26, N. S. This Day their Catholick Majesties left the Escorial, and are to lye at the Pardillo, where they will stay all To-morrow, in order to have the Diversion of a hunting March; and on the 28th at Noon they will be here at the Royal Palace. It is said, that the Marquess de Monteleon is to go to Venice as Ambassadour from his Catholick Majesty. Letters from Barcelona of the 17th Instant advise, that Count Konigseck the Imperial Ambassadour, is daily expected there, where he will stay six or seven Days, and then proceed hither. The said Ambassadour has borrowed the Count de Aguilar's Country Houfe two Leagues from hence, in order to stay there some few Days before he enters into this Town.
