THE Deputies of Zealand have notified to their High Mightinesses, that the States of that Province consent to the levying of the new Tarif or Customs for one Year. Orders are given for Detachments of Guards to go and lie on the Road, in order to attend the King of Great Britain from the Frontier of this Republick to Vaert, where the States Yachts are likewise ordered to wait for His Majesty and carry Him to Helvoetfluyts. Some of the Deputies of the States of Holland having taken a Turn since Saturday last to their respective Towns, will come back hither by the 27th Instant, in order to assist in the Assembly of those States, which is to be held that Day.

Hanover, Dec. 9, O. S. The Lord Viscount Townshend sets out from hence to Night for Diepenau, thence to proceed to Osnabrug where he will wait on his Royal Highness the Duke of York, and then go on to the Hague, where his Lordship proposes to pass four or five Days. The King has fixed Saturday the 18th Instant for his Departure from hence for Helvoetfluyts, which Journey will take up six or seven Days.

Hague, Dec. 28, N. S. The States of Holland having assembled Yesterday, adjourned to the 1st of next Month. The Lord Viscount Townshend arrived here last Night, and was this Morning visited by a great Number of Persons of Distinction

Madrid, Dec. 10, N. S. Letters from Cadiz of the 4th Instant have brought Advice, that the Ship Watkinson, belonging to the South-Sea Company, was arrived there with a large Cargo of Tobacco, Sugar, and Hides.

Whereas there have been some Instances where private Persons having brewed Ale and Beer, which at the Times of brewing thereof were really intended to have been used in their own private Families, but they by Losses and Misfortunes having been reduced to a Necessity of selling thereof, upon their Requests made before either selling or attempting to sell the same or any Part thereof, they, in Compassion to such unforeseen Accidents, have been indulged, and permitted to make Post-Entries thereof with the Officer of Excise, where such Accident has happened, and

upon their first paying the Excise Duties thereof, have, in such unforeseen Cases, been permitted to sell such Drink.

Now, lest any who brew Drink with Design to sell the same when fine and fit for Use, should expect the like Indulgence; The Commissioners of Excise hereby give Notice, That every Person before he brews for Sale, is by Law obliged to give Notice and make Entries of their respective Places and Utensils of Brewing, and of every their Cellars and Storehouses, under a Penalty of 50 l. for every such Utensil, Cellar, and Storehouse used without such previous Notice and Entry, to the Intent that all Places of such Brewing may be duly surveyed by Excise-Officers, and that they may take Accounts and may make Charges of all which is so brewed, and that the Duties may be paid at the Times limited by Law, as well for such Part as is for the private Use of the Parties, as for such Part as is intended for Sale, as is done by common Brewers and others who brew for Sale.

For the Reasons before, and in Justice to common Brewers, and other fair Traders in Beer and Ale, the Commissioners have ordered their Officers not to admit such Post-Entries, or receive the Duties of such Beer, or to licence such Persons to sell such Beer or Ale.

And that all such Practice being interfering in the Trade and Employment of common Brewers, and invading and undermining them in their lawful Employments, and directly contrary both to the Intent and Letter of the Laws now in Force; They the said Commissioners will, by their Duty, be obliged to cause all such Persons to be prosecuted for the Penalties in such Cases enacted and provided, of which this Notice is hereby given to prevent and obviate all Pretence of Ignorance.
