Madrid, December 17, N. S.

ON the 13th Instant the Duke of Riparda arrived here from Vienna by the Way of Genoa, where he embarked in the common Packet-Boat, (the Captain of the Galley which was made ready by order of the Republick of Genoa for his Passage, not being willing to venture out to Sea by Reason of the bad Weather) and landed at Barcelona after a Voyage of five Days. The same Evening he arrived here he went to the Palace, and was very graciously received by their Catholick Majesties, with whom he had an Hour's Conversation in their Closet. Two Days after his Catholick Majesty was pleased to declare the said Duke a Secretary of State, with the Appointments of two thousand Pistoles per Annum; but as yet he has not returned to Court to take Possession of that Employment, having been laid up with the Gout ever since the Day after his Arrival. This Morning Sig. Canales, Ambassadour from the Republick of Venice to this Court, made his Entry, and had his publick Audiences of their Catholick Majesties, the Prince of Asturias, and the Infantes. The Introducer of Ambassadours, and several Gentlemen of the Court, went to his House on Horseback, where the Ambassadour and his Retinue mounted on Horses sent to him from the King's Stable, and rode to the Palace, followed by one of the King's Coaches, four magnificent Coaches of the Ambassadour's; and four of other foreign Ministers. His Excellency returned to his House in the King's Coach, and the Gentlemen of the Court, together with those of the Ambassadour, followed in the other Coaches. The Marquess Mari, who commanded the Squadron which was employed this last Season against the Algerines, is still at Cadiz; though his Ships are laid up.

Turin, Dec 19, N. S. The King and Queen of Sardinia, with the Prince and Princess of Piedmont, arrived here the 15th Instant from the Veneria. The Princess is some Months gone with Child: The Court is going into Mourning for her Royal Highness's Grandfather the Prince of Hesse-Rottenbourg. The Count de Gambise Ambassadour to this Court from the most Christian King, will make his Entry the 31st of this Month. The King has given Order to the Officers of his Cavalry to remount their Troops, and to those of his Infantry to recruit their Companies and keep them full. It is proposed to send to Sardinia the Battalion of Sicilians, as also another Battalion which is to be formed out of the Invalids, which two Battalions consisting of about 500 Men each are to be the constant Guard of Sardinia, so that for the future Detachments will not be made from time to time (as has been done hitherto) from every Regiment for that Service.

Paris, Jan. 5, N. S. On the 1st Instant the Princes and Princesses of the Blood waited on the King and Queen at Versailles, to make their Compliments to their Majesties on the New Year. The Prevost des Marchands and Echevins of this City, went to Court likewise to pay their Compliments as usual on that Day. The same Day the King held a Chapter of the Order of the Holy Ghost, for investing Count Tarlo a near Relation of the Queen's with that Order, and the Knights having made a Procession to the Chappel of Versailles in their proper Habits, the King gave the Collar of the Order to the said Count Tarlo, with the usual Ceremonies. On the 2d the King and Queen set out from Versailles for Maity, where their Majesties will reside for some Time.
