Whitehall, January 8.

Yesterday about Noon a Messenger arrived from Rye, with Advice, That His Majesty continued (God be praised) in perfect Health, and had intended to have begun his Journey on Thursday Morning; but the Roads in that Part of the Country being mostly raised between Ditches, and those Ditches filled with Drifts of Snow which had fallen very thick, it was found necessary to give Orders for the clearing of the Ways so as to make His Majesty's Passage safe. His Majesty determined to set out on Friday the 7th, and had ordered his Coaches to attend at Nine in the Morning at a Place called the Point, whither His Majesty was to cross the Water from Rye. His Majesty designed to lye last Night at Hythe, this Night at Sittingborne, and to be at St. James's To-Morrow Night or on Monday at furthest.
