The King's moft Excellent Majefty in His Privy-Council.

W HEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of His Majefty's Reign, En-tituled, An Act for the more effectual punifhing wicked and evil difpofed Perfons going armed in Difguife, and doing Injuries and Violences to the Perfons and Properties of His Majefty's Subjects, and for the more speedy bringing the Offenders to Justice; it is (amongst other Things) Enacted, That if any Person or Persons, from and after the first Day of June, in the Year of our Lord One Thouland Seven Hundred and Twenty Three, being armed withSwords,FireArms or other offenfiveWeapons, and having his or their Faces blacked, or being otherwife difguifed, fhould appear in any Forreft, Chafe, Park, Paddock, or Grounds inclosed with any Wall, Pale, or other Fence, wherein any Deer had been or fhould be usually kept, or in any Warren or Place, where Hares or Conies had been or fhould be ufually kept, or in any High Road; open Heath, Common or Down, or fhould unlawfully and willfully hunt, wound, kill, deftroy, or iteal any Red or Fallow Deer, or unlawfully rob any Warren or Place where Conies or Hares were ufually kept, or fhould unlawfully fteal or take away any Fifh out of any River or Pond; or if any Perfon or Perfons from and after the faid firft Day of June, fhould unlawfully and wilfully hunt, wound, kill, deftroy, or steal any Red orFallowDeer, fed or kept in anyPlaces in any of His Majesty's Forrests, or Chases, which were or should be inclosed with Pales, Rails, or other Fences, or in any Park, Paddock, or Grounds inclofed, where Deer had been or fhould be ufually kept, or fhould unlawfully and malicioufly break down the Head or Mound of any Fish-Pond, whereby the Fish should be lost or destroyed; or fhould unlawfully and malicioufly kill, maim, or wound any Cattle, or cut down or otherwife deftroy any Trees planted in any Avenue, or prowing in any Garden, Orchard, or Plantation for Ornament, Shelter, or Profit, or fhould fet Fire to any House, Barn, or Outhouse, or to any

fhoot at any Person in any Dwelling-House or other Place, or fhould knowingly fend any Letter without any Name fubscribed thereto, or figned with a fictitious Name, demanding Money, Venk-fon, or other valuable Thing, or thould forcibly refcue any Perfon, being lawfully in Cuftody of any Officer or other Perfon for any of the Of-fences beforementioned; or if any Perfon or Per-fons fhould, by Gift or Promife of Money or other Reward, procure any of His Majefty's Subjects to joya him or them in any fuch underful to joyn him or them in any fuch unlawful Act, every Perfon fo offending, being thereof lawfully convicted, fhould be adjudged Guilty of Felony, and should fuffer Death as in Cales of Felony, without Benefit of Clergy. And whereas it is by the faid A&t further Enacted. That for the more eafy and fpeedy bringing the Offenders against the faid Act to Justice, That if any Person or Persons should be char-ged with being Guilty of any of the Offences aforefaid, before any two or more of HisMajesty's Juffices of the Peace of the County where fuch Offence or Offences were or fhould be committed, by Information of one or more Credible Perfon or Perfons upon Oath by him or them to be fubfcribed, fuch Juffices before whom fuch In-formation fhould be made as aforefaid, fhould forthwith certify under their Hands and Seals, and return fuch Information to one of the principal Secretaries of State of His Majefty, His Heirs or Succeffors, who is by the faid A& required to lay the fame as foon as conveniently might be before His Majefty, His Heirs or Succeffors, in His or their Privy Council ; whereupon it should and might be lawful for His Majesty, His Heirs or Successfors, to make His or their Order in His or their faid Privy Council, thereby requiring and commanding fuch Offender or Offenders to furrender him or themfelves, within the Space of Forty Days, to any of His Majefty's Juffices of the Court of King's-Bench, or to any one of His Majefty's Juffices of the Peace, to the End that he or they might be forthcoming to answer the Offence or Offences wherewith he or they fhould fo ftand charged, according to due Course of Law; which Order fhould be printed and publifhed

lifted in the next London Gazette, and should be forthwith transmitted to the Sheriff of the County where the Offence should be committed, and fhould, within fix Days after the Receipt thereof, be proclaimed by him or his Officers between the Hours of Ten in the Morning and Two in the Afternoon in the Market Places, upon the respective Market Days of two Market Towns in the same County near the Place where fuch Offence should have been committed, and a true Copy of fuch Order fhould be affixed upon fome publick Plece in fuch Market Towns; and in cafe fuch Offender or Offenders floyed not furrender him or themfelves, pursuant to such Order of His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, to be made in Council as aforesaid, he or they fo neglecting or refusing to furrender him or themfelves as aforefaid, should, from the Day appointed for his or their Surrender, as aforefaid, be adjudged, deemed, and taken to be convicted and attainted of Felony, and taken to be convicted Death as in cafe of a Perfon convicted and at-tainted by Verdict and Judgment of Felony without Benefit of Clergy ; and that it should be lawful to and for the Court of King's-Bench, or the Juffices of Oyer and Terminer, or General Goal Delivery for the County where the Offence fhould be fworn in fuch Information to have been committed, upon producing to them fuch Order in Council under the Seal of the faid Council, to award Execution against fuch Offender and Of-fenders in fuch manner as if he or they had been convicted and attainted in the faid Court of King's-Bench, or before fuch Juffices of Oyer and Terminer or General Goal Delivery refpec-tively, as by the faid Act may more fully ap-pear. And whereas in Purfuance of the Statute in that Cafe made and provided, the Right Honourable Charles Lord Vifcount Townshend one of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, did this Day lay before His Majefty in His Privy-Council, the Informations of Thomas Land, of the Parifh of Hambledon in the County of South-ampton, Yeoman, and of George Roe, Servant to Henry Barlow the Elder, of the Parifh of Hambledon in the County aforefaid, Yeoman, being credible Witnesser, taken upon their respective Oaths the 27th Day of December 1725, before Henry Stanyford, Efgr.; and Doctor Samuel Brady, two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Taid County of Southampton, according to the Form of the Statute in that Cafe made and provided.
