

# The London Gazette.

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Falmouth, January 24.

**T**He 20 instant arriv'd here the *Thomas* and *Ann* of *Dartmouth*, together with the *Rose* of *Weymouth*, laden with Fruits and Wine from *Malaga*; and this day put in here the *Roche* of *London*, homeward bound from *Galiz*.

*Rome*, January 9. On Monday next his Holyness hath appointed a Consistory to be held, for the farther debating the matter concerning the Restitution of *Castro*, in which the Minister at present here, on the part of the Duke of *Parma*, seems to promise himself the greater success; in that he finds the Pope very much inclined to favor his Matter, in this his pretence; however, many of the Cardinals still oppose with much earnestness, the restitution of this place, alleadging, it will be of great prejudice to the Church.

There being now upon the death of the Cardinal *Borromeo*, five places void in the Sacred Colledge, the several pretenders seem the more to press his Holyness, to make the intended promotion of Cardinals; in which affair, amongst others, the Spanish Ambassador appears extraordinary active, as desiring nothing more, then to see this promotion, in which he promises himself, *Father Nisard* will have a Cap, past, before he set forward for *Naples*, though it is reported, that he resolves to begin his journey thither the 23 instant.

We daily expect here the Duke of *Brunswick* from *Venice*, several of his Trays being already arrived, and a Palace prepared for his Reception here. It is variously reported, who may have the care of the Imperial affairs, after the departure of the Cardinal, *Landgrave* of *Hesse*; amongst the chief pretenders, are, as is said, the Cardinal *Borromeo*; and the *Count* of *Cologna*.

Out of *St. Peter's Church* was some nights since stolen, all the Silver Lamps, together with several other things of considerable value; the Felons though they were presently pursued, and notwithstanding all the search that hath been since made, escaping with their rich booty.

*Warsaw*, January 11. The 9 instant arriv'd here the *Heer von Oberheck*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburgh*; it is said, his Errand is to desire of the States of this Kingdom, who are to be this Month assembled here, the Ratification of a Treaty some time since made, between this Crown and that Elector. From the *Ukraine* we daily receive worse, and worse news; our last Letters from thence, tell us, that *Doroshenko* was encamped with an Army of 27000 Men near *Cybalowka*, of which 18000 were Tartars; that he expected more Forces to command, join with him, with which he intended to attempt the recovery of what he lost this Summer, and more, to make himself absolute over those Countries; in the mean time our Forces, at present in their winter quarters in those parts, extremely complain, not onely of their want of pay, but that they are not able to procure sustentance for themselves and Horses; so that there seems to be

much cause to fear new Troubles in the *Ukraine*; not prevented by the speedy Resolutions of this next Dyet, for the providing a sufficient power, with which they may be able to meet all new dangers in their beginning, and so secure the peace of the Kingdom; the King hath ordered part of his Guards, to march forthwith towards those parts, to relieve and ease in what they may the Forces there, who are at present, as we are told, but weak and ill provided.

*Venice*, January 15. We have now received the confirmation of the arrival of our Ambassador the *Chevalier Quirini* at *Constantinople*, and that he was very much indisposed, which besides his former weakness, was occasioned by the inconveniences of his journey.

The Grand Visier continues at *Constantinople*, very earnest in the forwarding the preparations he is making against Spring, and the Grand Signior at *Adrianople*, being, as is said, very much displeas'd at the delay of his Chiaus at *Warsaw*, where he is to demand Restitution of the *Ukraine* to the *Cossacks*; and whilst none can believe, that that Crown will ever part with so large a Territory, which they have so long possessed, all men are of opinion, that the preparations this Port are making are intended against that Kingdom.

From *Corfu* they write, that the French Commissary had taken all the French Slaves out of the Gallies of this State, and had embarked them there, in order to their transportation for *France*.

*Vienna*, January 16. The Spanish Ambassador here, goes on very vigorously for the raising the three Regiments in these Territories, for the service of the Spanish *Neatherlands*; it is said, that the *Count de Schellard*, is to have the chief care of these Levies; the Recruits for the Imperial Regiments go on apace; so that they may be very suddenly compleat.

By a Courier arriv'd from *Turkey*, we are told, that the Grand Signior certainly intends a War against *Poland* this Spring, to which they are the more encouraged, by the many Factions, they hear, still continues amongst the Nobility of that Crown, so far, that they seem hardly unanimous, for the providing for their common safety. The Emperor hath lately desired of the States of his Hereditary Countries, 800000 Guilders; towards the extraordinary expences of this year.

*Danzick*, January 17. Here are Letters in Town, which come from *Lithuania*, telling us, that they had advic'd there, that the Rebellion in *Muscovy* had now got footing in the parts near *Smolensku*; and the Conduct of the pretended Prince of *Muscovy* eldest Son to the present *Czar*, who dyed at *Moskov* some years since; but who, as these Rebels alleadge, left the Court in discontent, and took Arms to suppress the too great authority of the Boyars; and was thereupon by them reported dead; this story, how notoriously countervailt soever it is, and though underneath this same pretence, the Rebellion hath been nowis'd in other parts of *Moscovy*, yet meets there with so much credit amongst the vulgar, as to draw many of them from

the Obedience they owe their Prince; They further write, that the report of *African* having surrendered to the Czars Forces, is not at all confirmed, but on the contrary, the Rebels continue very powerful there. The People of *Walachy* are said to have lately revolted from their Prince, and desired the Port would appoint an other to rule over them.

*Madrid, January 20* The 9 instant arrived here his Excellency the Earl of *Sunderland*, Ambassador Extraordinary from His Majesty, of *Great Britain*, being lodged at my Lord Ambassador *Godolphin's* House till the 14<sup>th</sup>, when his Excellency was conducted to a House prepared by the Queens order for his entertainment, according to the custom of this Court, the 16 instant his Excellency, together with my Lord Ambassador *Godolphin*, had private Audience of their Majesties, with the usual Ceremonies.

The Duke of *Armsberg*, having lately Married *Princess de Larko* Sister to the *Conde d'Aguilar*, and Maid of Honor to the Queen, her Majesty in favor of this Marriage, hath conferred on the said Duke, the Command of a Major General in the *Armies*. *Don Luis Enriquez* second Son to the Admirant, is by the Queens order retired from Court, for that he had forcibly taken a Page of his, out of the hands of Justice, into which, he had upon some offence been committed.

*Don Pablo de Bando Maestro* at *Castilla* General, and *Don Martin Sanchez Pardo*, General of the *Artillery* in *Catalonia*, have in respect of their great ages, obtained leave to quit those employments, yet to retain the Profits during life. It is reported here, that *Don Antonio de Cordova*, the new President of *Panama*, who parted some time since, with three men of War from *Chase*, for the West Indies, with necessary Recruits for their Garrisons in those parts, had met near the *Canary Islands*, with some Turks, men of War, with whom he had a very warm dispute for several hours, yet so, that after they had quitted him, he was forced to put into one of those Islands, to repair the damage his Vessel had received in the rencounter.

From *Malaga* they write, of the instant, that some days before there put in the *Swedish* Frigate, who departed again the 11 with several Merchant men under her Conoy for *England*. That about the same time, there likewise, arrived Captain *Beach* from *Pom Mahon*, where he reported, he left Sir *Edward Spragge*, arrived from *Angiers*, disposing matters in order to his return home, which were in such a forwardness, that he might in 20 days at farthest, be expected from thence at *Malaga*. The seventh Captain *Beach* sailed thence towards *India* and *Tangier*, from whence he intended to continue his Voyage for *England*.

*Cologne, January 20*. In eight days time are past by this place, above 14000 French, Horse and Foot, the former being bravely Mounted and Armed, most of which Forces, are since past the *Rhyn*, and march towards *Munster*; besides which, there passed yesterday near this place, 4000 Men more; at *Nuis* are at present lodged, 2000 Switzers, the Troops which were before in Garrison there, being marched towards *Westphalia*, so that these parts begin to be full of Foreign Forces, the general report being, that we may expect to see this Spring, an Army of 40000 Men in these Countries.

From *Dorsten* we have advice, that there were arrived 300 Horse, and that the Bishop of *Munster* hath ordered a review to be made of all his Forces. At *Nuis* the French Troops have taken the Oath

of Fidelity to the Eledor, into whose Service their Officers told them, they were now sent by his most Christian Majesty.

*Paris, February 1*. Here is arrived Monsieur de *Lamoignon*, together with the *Mareschal de Crequi*, from the part about *Cologne*, his Majesty hath now lately made the former *Conseiller d'Etat*. Here hath been held a Council of War, where the *Mareschal de Crequi* was likewise present; it is said, that the Prince de *Condé* will Command in chief the Kings Forces this Campaign. The *Heer Groenius*, the Dutch Ambassador, is preparing for his departure.

*Brussels, February 1*. On Saturday last his Excellency the Count de *Montorey*, being accompanied by the *Regent*, and the other Deputies of the States General went to visit the Fortifications of this place, on which they began to work again with their former diligence; his Excellency having commanded all Persons, as well Ecclesiastical as others, to be assisting for the advancement of this work.

We hear here as yet, when the *Mirrors* of *Spain* may begin their journey for *England*. At *Orleans* are arrived two Spanish Ships from *St. Sebastian*, who speak of several Companies more, which may be very suddenly ready to follow them.

*Brussels, February 2*. The third Estate, the States of *Holland* and *Westphalia* were assembled again, and resumed the debate of several matters which depend before them. We hear of nothing farther done, in the Affair of his Highness the Prince of *Orange*. Next week the Commissioners for the new levies, will, as we are told, be given out. We cannot yet observe any final resolution of the States General concerning this years Equipage.

His Excellency my Lord Ambassador *Blanchart*, not having been able after all his patience and several repeated instances by Memorial, to obtain an answer from the States General, in the matter of the *Flagg*, is preparing for his return home, and accordingly hath requainted the States with it. It is confidently reported, that the Count de *Dillon*, hath made an agreement with this State, for the bringing into their service 3000 Switzers, within the space of four Months. The third instant went hence an Express with dispatches to my Ambassador in *England*, relating, as is said, to the present Affairs. To morrow or next day at farthest is expected here Prince *Maltrait*.

The Council of State have lately received a Letter from the States of *Friesland*, concerning the Fortifying several places, and reinforcing the Garrisons on their Frontiers. The Velt Marshal *Wirtz*, together with the other Deputies, who had been by Order of the States, to visit the Fortifications of *Aernhem* &c. are returned, and have accordingly made their report to the States, who have thereupon resolved to have that work immediately gone about.
