E have just now received Advice from Elsenabb, that Sir Charles Wager having been joined by the Nassau and Port-Mahon on the both, let fail at Three this Morning, with the Squadron under his Command, for the Gulph of Finland. The Wind was fair for his getting out of the Scheeren, but not for his advancing farther Eastwards at present. By the last Letters from Petersbourg, which are of the 13th Instant, we have an Account, that the Land Forces which had been drawn together near that Place, were fent to work on the Ladoga Canal, and the Fortifications at Cronflot. The Czarina's the Fortifications at Cronflot. Journey to Riga began to be doubtfully spoken of, and they talked of nothing more than exerci-fing their Men as usual. The last Mail going from Stockholm to Petersbourg was stolen and carried off, about 12 Miles on this fide Petersbourg, having in it some Money and Bills be-longing to Swedish Merchants. Hague, June 14, N. S. A Project has been proposed to the States of Holland, upon which the respective Members of the States are to consult their Towns before they return to meet here again; which is, to lay a Tax upon all Places and Offices, (the Gentlemen in the Regency and the Officers of the Courts of Justice excepted,) and to apply the Produce of it to the intended Augmentation of the Forces. The States General having notified to the Province of Utrecht the Resolution of Groningen to acceed to the Treaty of Hanover, have since fixed a certain Time to the said Province for their coming into it; declaring otherwise their being resolved to proceed in that Affair without the said Province. Mr. Finch, the French Ambassadour, and the Prussian Minister, had Conferences with the Deputies of the States General Yesterday and to Day, and are to have another To-morrow, and it is not in the least doubted, but that the Difficulties which have hitherto obstructed the Affair of the Accession to the Treaty of Hanover will soon be removed.

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Paris, June 14, N. S. The King having resolved to take the Government of his Kingdom into his own Hands, has suppressed the Employment of Prime Minister. The Bishop of Frejus is under his Majesty to have the Inspection of the several

Departements of the Government.

Dublin, May 28. This being His Majesty's Birth-Day, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments on Duty which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green. At Noon there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction at the Castle, to compliment the Lords Justices, before whom a Song was performed; and at Night there was a Play given

by their Excellenties for the Entartainment of the Ladies.
