Paris, July 3, N. S. On the 25th past his Excellency Mr. Walpole, the British Ambassadour, had a private Audience of the King, being introduced by the Count de Monconseil, Introduc'tor of Ambassadours. Circular Letters are issued for the holding of a General Assembly of the Clergy of France at Melun, which Assembly is to be opened the 25th of September next.
