may be; We have thought good to recommend it to you, that at your fift General Meeting in the Month of July next, you do take into your Consideration the State of the said Fisheries and Manufactures, and of the Moneys provided for encouraging the same, and that by yourselves or by Committees of your Number, you desife and propose the parayour Number, you devile and propose the particular Methods, Rules and Regul tions which to you shall seem the most proper, for the Application of the said Sums towards the encouraging and promoting of Fisheries, and such other Manusactures and Improvements in Scotland as shall most conduce to the General Good of the United Kingdom; and that you do return to Us the Propolitions in which you shall have agreed, to the End that upon due Consideration thereof, a certain Method may be settled for the Application and Management of those Sums for the future.
