Madrid, July 22, N. S.

ON the 17th Instant, the Battalion of Spanish Guards which are quartered here, having been new cloathed, were reviewed in the Palace Yard, and performed their Exercise before their Catholick Majesties, who stood in the great Balcony at the Palace; and the next Day the Battalion of Walloon Guards which are also in Quarters here made the like Appearance. On the 20th in the Evening the publick Rejoycings for the Birth of the late Infanta were begun by letting off in the Palace-Yard Fireworks which represented a large Castle, and Yesterday in the Evening their Catholick Majesties went in Publick to the Convent of Atocha where Te Deum was sung; and at their Return going through the Plaza Mayor, the whole Square was illuminated with white Wax Flambeaux, and after they were entred the Palace Fireworks were let off which represented a Ship of War attacking a Castle. This Night other Fireworks are to be played off, and To-morrow the Bull Feast is to be performed in the Plaza Mayor. On the 24th their Catholick Majesties will set out for St. Ildefonso.

Paris, Aug. 6, N. S. On Sunday the 4th Instant Te Deum was sung in our Cathedral, the Superior Courts of Justice assisting with the usual Ceremonies, in Thanksgiving for the King's Recovery; and at Night there were Bonfires and Illuminations throughout the City.
