Count Bonde, President of the College of Mines, who was the Beginning of last Year sent as Head of a Commission that was appointed to inquire into the Grounds of the many Complaints that were made to the last Dyet of great Abuses committed both by the Civil and Military Officers in Finland, returned from that Dutchy some Days ago; and it is said he will be a Candidate for the Post of Land-Marshal at the approaching Dyet. On the 1st Instant, being the Anniversary of His Britannick Majesty's Accesfion to the Throne, His Minister Mr. Poyntz gave a very splendid Entertainment to the British Factory and others of that Nation at this Place; and in the Evening a Ball.
