**F**OR these three Weeks past Workmen have been continually employed in building new Stables at the Royal Palace for about 200 Horses: And an Apartment is fitting up with the same Expedition, as it is said, for the Prince of Brazil; whose Household it is thought will be appointed by his Portuguese Majesty before the Marquess de los Balbases arrives from Spain. He is expected here before the End of November, and 'tis believed the Marquess de Abrantes will set out for Madrid the Beginning of the same Month. Orders were issued last Week for the advancing of Sixty Thousand Crowns to the said Marquess de Abrantes, for the Expence of his Journey to the Court of Spain; and his Appointments are settled at Five Thousand Crowns a Month. Advice being come, that the Fleet which sailed from hence in February last for the Rio de Janeiro, arrived safely there on the 15th of April, and would be ready to return to Portugal in the June following, the Victoria a Sixty Gun Ship has been fitted out, and will sail from hence To-morrow, in order to cruize as far as the Western Islands, and there wait the Arrival of the said Fleet, and strengthen their Convoy.

Paris, Sept. 28. On the 22d Instant the King went into Mourning for the Death of Prince Maximilian of Hanover; which had been notified to his Majesty by his Excellency Mr. Walpole the British Ambassadour. The King has been some Days at Fontainebleau, and the Queen setting out from Versailles the 25th Instant, arrived the next Day at Fontainebleau, having lain one Night at Petit-Bourg, a Seat of the Duke d'Antin's. His Majesty having made the Marshal Duke de Tallard, and the Marshal d'Huxelles, Councillours, they both took their Places in the Council of State on the 25th Instant. On the 22d the Marshal d'Estrees set out from hence, in order to preside in the Assembly of the States of Britany. The General Assembly of the Clergy of France was opened here the 25th, in the Church of the Convent of the Augustines.

Whitehall, Sept. 3, 1726.
