R. Poyntz, the British Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary, having on the 19th Instant delivered to the King and Queen of Sweden a Letter from His Britannick Majesty notifying the Death of Prince Maximilian of Hanover; this Court goes into Mourning on that Occasion on the 23d. The Secret Committee chosen by the several Orders of the States, and consisting of Fifty Persons of the Nobility and Gentry, Twenty sive of the Clergy, and Twenty sive of the Burghers, having met and settled the Forms of their Proceedings, had the King's Proposals sent to them on the 17th.

Hague, Oct. 15, N.S. The States of the Province of Holland refumed their Assembly to Day. The States have received the Treaty signed by M. Sommelsdyk with the Algerines. Five Men of War of M. Sommelsdyk's Squadron are to continue in the Streights till they are relieved by others next Spring, and it is said the Number will be then
