**T**HE 19th Instant being her Catholick Majesty's Anniversary-Day, the Feast of St. Isabella, there was at the Escorial a great Concourse of the Chief Nobility and Gentry, who according to Custom kissed her Catholick Majesty's Hand. On the 21st Count Conigleck the Emperour's Ambassadour, came hither from the Escorial with his Lady and all his Family, on account of his having an Attack of the Gout (of which he is recovered) and of his Lady's being indisposed of a Fever; and as the Court is to be here in a few Days, he does not intend to return to the Escorial. The Queen of Spain being declared with Child, their Catholick Majesties, with the Royal Family will leave the Escorial on the 27th Instant, and lye that Night at the Pardillo, and the next Day will come to reside at the Royal Palace here. Orders have been sent by Don Joseph Patinno to all the Sea Coasts of Spain, to inroll all the Spanish Sailors and Boatmen, according to the same Rule they are in France, in order to supply out of them as Occasion shall offer his Catholick Majesty's Ships of War. It is believed that the whole Number of them will not amount to more than 6000, out of which hardly the third Part can be reckoned actual Sailors. The Pope's Nuncio after having received Letters from France, went Yesterday Morning to the Escorial, and at Night had a long Audience of their Catholick Majesties. Letters

from Cadiz of the 19th Instant relate, that 250 Sailors were arrived there from Mayorca, to man the Genoese Ship bought by the Marquess Mari; and that the Advice-Boats prepared to be sent to the West-Indies are still in that Harbour, waiting for Orders from Court.

*Stockholm, Nov. 9.* On the 6th Instant at Night the Muscovite Ambassadour arrived at Waxholm, about five Leagues from hence, whither the Envoy Count Gallowin went down early the next Morning to meet him with a Barge, and the same Evening they came up together to Count Gallowin's Lodgings, where he stayed that Night, and Yesterday he dined at M. Ruchel's the Holstein Envoy, from whence in the Evening he went first to the House of Count Charles Bielke, which was hired for him about two Months ago, and for which he is to pay 100 Ducats per Month. It is said he proposes to notify to Day his Arrival to Count Banier as President at present of the Chancery, and desire a Conference with him, in order to obtain an Audience of their Swedish Majesties.
