Madrid, Feb. 3, N.S. Letters from Cadiz of the 28th of 1sh Month give an Account, that the Preparations there for the Siege of Gibraliar were carried on with all Duligence. That for a Week beautiful of the state o tore, they had been imbarking a vast Number of Scaling-Ladders, with the Deal Boxes filled with Cork, (described in former Advices:) But that, notwithhanding the great Hurry they appeared to be in, it was not yet known when the Siege could be begun: Because though a great Part of the Iron Artillery and Ammunition, was already arrived at the Camp; yet the Brass Artillery, which went by Land, but not contained that Letters from Cally. had not got above four Leagues from Cadiz, fome of it not fo far. It was on the 13th of last Month that Rear-Admiral Hopson arrived in the Bay of Gibraltar with seven British Men of War-
