If your Majesty by your great Vigilance had not discovered the secret Designs formed by your Enemies, or had remained a Specta-tor only of them, Ingratitude and Violation of publick Faith would have been attended with Prosperity; and this Kingdom, form'd by Nature of all others the most secure, would (when undefended) have become an easy Prey to that Ambition we may now justly

It is but a few Years fince some of our Fellow-Subjects, weary of their Religion and Liberty, by a desperate Rebellion, involved their Country in a Scene of Blood and Confusion; fighting in a Cause, where if Victors they must have become Slaves, and where their Happiness depended upon their being over-

Royal Mind; the rendering your Enemies uncapable of diffurbing your Government, and compelling them to enjoy the happy Fruits of Peace, which they neither merit nor de-fire, will be a more noble Event in the History of your Majesty's Reign, than the most

fplendid Triumph over them.

As the present Desensive Measures, and the happy Consequences of them, must fill the Hearts of all your Majesty's faithful Subjects with the greatest Joy and Satisfaction, so they will raise in those who are disaffected to your Person and Government the utmost Rage and Despair; they will find their secret Practices exposed, and the last Hopes of their dying Cause become vain and imaginary; they will calumniate your Servants, for their Fidelity to your Majesty and the immediate Interests of Great Britain; they will inveigh against the employing of your Fleet, and strengthening your Army, because at this critical Juncture they are necessary for the publick Safety; they will date their Aversion to one great Power abroad from the Time it became under solemn Engagements to assist us, and their Assection Assection and their Assection Assection and their Assection Assection assection as a section of the section assection as a section of the section as a se another from its Breach of Treaties, Acts of the highest Ingratitude, and secret Combination to attempt the Destruction of the Protestant Succession.
