Madrid, Feb. 17, N.S. Count Conigfeck is still indisposed of the Gout, so that he has not been able to go to the Pardo to have his usual Audiences of their Catholick Majesties; nor is his Courier so long expected from Vienna arrived yet; But the Marques de la Paz came from the Pardo twice last Week to The last Post from Paris brought His Britannick Majesty's Speech to his Parliament, with the vigorous Resolutions of both Houses to support the Measures his Majesty has entred into, for the Defence of his Dominions and the Trade of his Subjects, and to furnish the Supplies which shall be requisite for that Purpole: Which has very much dejected the Jacobite Party. Letters from the Camp before Gibraltar of the 9th Instant relate, that the bad Weather and continual Reins and made it impossible to the result of the tinual Rains had made it impossible to bring up the Battering Pieces of Brass Cannon which lay upon the Road from Cadiz, and had also occasioned dangerous Sicknesses among the Troops, of which many Men daily dye; and that great Numbers continued to desert, several of which had sled into Gibraltar, where the Governour not thinking it convenient to keep them, had font them on board the Men of War: And that it was not known what Day the Trenches would be opened. Letters from Cadiz of the 11th Instant advise, that an English Vessel came in there

that Day, the Masser of which brought an Accounts that he met Sir Charles Wager with the Squauron under his Command off Cape St. Vincent, with a fair Wind making for the Streights: And Letters from Gibralcar, which came in this Morning advise, that Nine Men of War, one of which carried a Flag, were coming into that Bay; and it was not doubted they were Sir Charles Wager's Squadron. Letters from Malaga of the 11th Inflant relate, that the Duke of Wharton with his Lady was arrived there; that the Magistrates had provided a House for them; and it was said he would leave his Family there, and go himself as a Voluntier to the Spanish Camp. That on the 8th Instant a French Ship arrived at Malaga from Barcelona; with Cannon Ball and other Military Stores, which are to be fent in small Imbarkations to Algeziras; that the said French Ship brought also 50 Gunners, as had a Spanish Ship 50 more, who all set out on the 9th by Land for the Camp: And that 30 Miners who came in another Spanish Velsel from Barcelona, proceeded by Sea for the Spanish Camp.

Whiteball, Februar; 23. By Letters from Vice-Admiral Hoher, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Squadron in the West Indies, dated from Jamaica the 14th of December lait, we have an Account, that by reason of the great Mortality and Sickness on board the Ships, they had been obliged to repair to that Island, where the Sick Men had been put on Shore; but by the Vigilance and Care of the Vice-Admiral, seconded by the hearty and zealous Assistance of the President and Council, the Squadron was so far recruited, that he would put to Sea again with the greatest Part of it in six or seven Days.
