To the King's most Excellent Majesty The humble Address of the Mayor, Alder-men, Bayliffs and Burgesse, High-Steward, Under-Steward, Gentlemen, and other the Inhabitants of your Majesty's Borough of New-Windfor in the County of Berks.

May it pleafe your Majefty, IN the midft of the greateft Calm and Se-curity at Home that any People are capable of enjoying, happy in the best and most humane of Princes, the pureft Religion, and the fulleft Possethion of Liberty and Property, (Plants that thrive and flourish only in a Protestant Soil,) we on a fudden see a Storm gathering from Abroad that threatens us with the Destruction of all these Blellings at once, and to force upon us in Exchange a bigotted Popish Pretender, whom we neither Love nor Fear, and an Arbitrary absolute Government, the very worft of human Calamities that can pollibly happen to this free Nation.

We find with Indignation your most Sacred Majesty, together with the British Honour and Commerce, insulted (in Breach of the most folemn Treaties) by a Prince whom we lately faw in this Place under very different

Circumstances, and who owes it to the Britifh Generofity and Valour that either him, felf or his Family are in a Condition at this Tune to infult them or any other Nation.

But we are still more surprized to hear of the fame injurious Treatment from another Prince who is fo ill informed of the true Affections and real Interest of the People of Great-Britain, as to dream of succeeding in an Invalion of your Majesty's Kingdoms in favour of the desperate Fortunes of the baffled Pretender and his perjured Adherents, at the fame Time forgetting (we prefume) that he himfelf has not been able to defend or preferve his own Dominions.

Under these Provocations, if your Majesty, in Conjunction with your high Allies, shall be compelled to draw your Sword in the Defence of our Religion, our Laws, and all those Advantages of Commerce, which alone have diffinguilhed this happy Ifland from the neighbouring World, as the Seat of Liberty, Plenty, and Eafe ; we have the ftrongeft Reafons to promife ourfelves and our Fellow-Subjects fuch an Islue of so necessary a War, as may be glorious to your Majesty's Arms in the prefent, and productive of the Bleffings of Peace to fucceeding Generations.

That, your Majefty's Reign may be long and prosperous over us; and that this Nation may always remain and be under the gracious Protection and Government of your facred Majefty and your Royal Descendants to all Ages, are the daily Prayers of,

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bishop Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Exeter, and of the Clergy of the Diocese of Exeter.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

W E your Majefty's dutiful Subjects, the Clergy of the Diocele of Exeter, feeing not only the Commerce of your Kingdoms at once affaulted and undermined, but an Invation of England agreed upon to inthrone the Enemy of our Religion; unlefs we fhould forget the Situation and particular Interefts of these Countries, cannot be flow to acknowledge and implore the Continuance of your Majefty's Royal Cares in our Favour, and profess our chearful Dependence, under the Divine Aid, on your known Wildom and Magnanimity.

Permit us at the fame Time, most gracious Sovereign, to lay at your Feet, and publish to all the World this Testimony and Engagement of our Resolution, to support in our Stations the Measures taken by your Majessy for the necessary Defence of Church and State; their present Happiness and all their Interests are infeparably united with those of your Majessy and Royal Family; and our Conviction of that, makes our Zeal and Fidelity immoveably the same for both. Religion, which inforces these Sentiments, obliges us also to propagate and fix them amongst a loyal and brave People.

And that it may pleafe Almighty God to infpire all your Subjects with a full Senfe of the Happinels He has given them under your Government, and the Duty thence refulting both to your Majefty and themfelves, of a zealous and inviolable Union in your Service; a id that he would crown your Counfels and Arms with the Success of realluring the precious Rights of your People, Religious and Civil; a Success your Majefty to paternally, to chriftianly prefers to all the Glories of Conqueft.

These are our fervent Prayers, and from the Conduct of Affairs our just Hopes, and they shall be funcerely followed with fuitable Endeavours.

Madrid, Feb. 24, N. S. Our laft Letters from the Camp before Gibraltar, are of the roth Inffant, and advile, that the Retardment of the March of the Artillery; occasioned by the Impracticablenels of the Roads from the continual Rains fallen of late in those Parts, had obliged the Spaniards to fulpend the opening of the Trenches : But that two or three

Days before, the Weather having changed and become fair, it was expected that in five or fix Days more fo many Pieces of the faid Artillery might be brought up, as would fuffice for their first Batteries; which was the only thing wanting for the opening of the l'renches, and what M. de Verboom, in Oppolition to the Importunity of the Conde de las Torres, positively insisted upon, before any other Operation should be undertaken. All the Letters from the faid Camp agree, that the Army is already weakened near a fourth Part, by Sickness and Defertion. His Catholick Majesty has been pleased to appoint Don Geronimo de Uztariz to be Secretary of the Council of Finances, and Don Manos Montoto (who was one of the Duke de Ripperda's chief Clerks) to be Secretary of the Revenue called Millones. His Catholick Majesty has also granted to Don Guillermo Eon (the Director for the Affiento de Negros, who lately came from London) the Title and Rank of Counfellour for the Indies, with a Penfion of Six Hundred Pittoles To-Morrow Night, their Catholick a Year. Majefties will remove from the Pardo to the Palace here, and the Day following will go to refide for fome Weeks at the Buen-Retiro. It is advised from St. Andero, that they continue there with all poffible. Expedition the building of three Seventy Gun Ships, one of a Hundred and Sixteen Guns, and two Bomb-Veflels, which they expect will be ready to be launched by the End of April next : That a vast Quantity of Timber is daily brought thither upon Wheel-Carriages from the Mountains, the greatest Part of which is to be ship-ped off for Cadiz, where Ships are to be built, and the rest is to remain at St. Andero for the fame Purpose : That the Rosario, a Frigate of 50 Guns lately built, commanded by Captain Baltazar Sherlock, and the St. Francis, another new-built Ship of the fame Force, commanded by Captain Galpar Rue, are compleating their Men from what People they can gather upon that Coast and from Galicia. Letters from Malaga of the 18th Instant relate, that two Veffels were arrived there from Barcelona laden with Cannon-Ball for the Camp : And that the Duke of Wharton, with his Lady and Family, was to fet out the

Day following for the Spanish Camp. Cadiz, Feb. 18, N.S. A Person who came hither Yesterday from the Spanish Camp, brought an Account, that Sir Charles Wager with his Squadron came into the Bay of Gibraltar the 13th Instant : This Person confirms, as indeed do all the Letters from that Camp, the great Sickness in the Spanish Army and Desertion from it : That besides the Hardships they suffer from the Severity of the Weather, they are in want of Provisions : That feven of the Cannon which went by Land from hence, were got to the Camp ; and the rest he faw upon the Road

Road at a great Diffance from thence, funk into the Mire; fo that till the Ways become better, it will be impossible for them to pro-ceed any further. The St. Antonio, a new built Ship, came in here a few Days ago from St. Andero; fhe is of the fame Dimensions as another new Ship called the St. Carlos, which is likewife here and carries 68 Guns; but as the Guns of the latter were thought too much crowded, the St. Antonio is made with Ports for only 56. Here are also two other Ships of War of 60 Guns each, one of 50, two of 30, two of 26, and one of 24: And though their Expedition to Gibraltar feems to be no longer thought of, our new Intendant is very bufy in compleating their feveral Equi-pages, which are very bad, confifting of Peafants and Country-People, who not being ufed to Sea, every Day fall Sick, and are brought to the Hofpital. The Intendant brought to the Holpital. has therefore fent to Buelva, Ayamonte, and the other Rivers hereabouts, for a Supply

of Boatmen; who were registred a few Months ago for this Purpose. *Paris, March* 7, N. S. Yesterday Morning arrived here from England, his Excellency Horatio Walpole, Esq; Ambassadour Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Britannick Majesty to the most Christian King.
