Not content with a Delign to impoverish a rich and flourishing Nation, by turning the Stream of Commerce into another Channel, or with the Demand of Places effential to the Security of our Trade, acquired in a just War, and ascertained to us by folemn Treaties, they would add the worft of Milchiefs, the Impofition of a Popilh Pretender.

This last Infult, above all others, raises our Indignation. If ever God, for our Sins, should fuffer that vile Project to take Effect,

it must intirely reverse all the distinguishing Advantages procured to these Kingdoms by the Glorious Revolution, and fince farther fecured with the Expence of fo much Blood and Treafure, and deprive late Pofterity of all the Happinels contrived for them by the wife Counfels of King William, of Immortal Me-mory. It must fubvert our Fundamental Laws, which fecure the Right of your Majefty and of our Protestant Descendents to reign over Britain, as firmly as they fecure to British Subjects their private Rights. It must there-fore inevitably involve us in Confusion and Ruin: And not affect Britons alone, but the Liberties of Europe, and the Protestant Inte-reft in general; for we are perfwaded, the Conviction is growing Universal, that nei-ther the one nor the other of these can sublist without the Protestant Succession.

Tho? Events are out of all humane Reach, yet we cannot but hope, from the watchful Care of that kind Providence which hath fo often been exerted in our Favour, from the Juffice of the Caufe in which we are engaged, from the wife Precautions already taken by your Majesty, from the Fidelity and Steadi-nels of your Counsels, from the Zeal of your Parliament, and from your great and extenfive Alliances, That fuch pernicious Defigns, inftead of being attended with Succefs, will be made to iflue in the firmer Eftablifhment of your Majefty's Throne, and the Tranquility of your People.

For this we offer up our hearty Prayers to the King of Kings: And we shall not cease to use our best Endeavours to recommend all dutiful and chearful Subjection to your righteous Government. And while we are repeating the Affurance of our inviolable Adherence to your Majesty and your Royal House, we believe we speak the Sense of all who attend our Ministrations, who are zealously devoted bv

by Principle and Affection, as well as by Inte-1 reft, to your Perfon and Family.

Madrid, March 3, N. S. On the 25th paft their Catholick Majesties came from the Pardo to the Buen-Retiro, where they will remain for three Months. On the 26th this Court dispatched a Courier to Paris, in Anfwer to the Letters which the Duke of Bournonville's

from Vienna by the Way of Paris: By the faid Courier Advice was fent of the Spanish Army's having opened the Trenches before Gibraltar on the 21ft paft-at Night. Two Couriers more from Vienna are arrived at this Court within this laft Week. On the 27th part his Excellency Mr. Stanhope, Amballa-dour of the King of Great Britain, went to the Masquess de la Paz and acquainted him, that Hostilities having been begun by the Spanish Army before Gibraltar, he had taken his Resolution to leave this Court without Lofs of Time, and for that Purpole defired his Catholick Majesty would please to grant him the neceffary Paffports for Himfelf, his Family, and his Equipages : Though the Marquels promifed thole Paffports immediately, yet they have not hitherto been deli-vered to his Excellency : But he expects them to Morrow, and proposes to set out from hence the 5th or oth Instant The Duke of Liria having received at his Catholick Majefty's Treasury Eight Thousand Pistoles for his Journey, and Four Thouland Piftoles more in Advance on Account of his Appointments as Amballadour from Spain to Mulcovy, intends to be going in a few Days by the Way of Italy and Vienna. Letters from Cadiz of the 25th past advise, that the Governour, in Confequence of the Hoftilities begun against Gibraltar, has detained four British Merchant Ships till he shall receive Orders from Court; but that he has not mo-Jefted yet the British Merchants reliding there: And that feveral Boats which went with Stores for the Camp, having heard the firing of the Cannon, are returned for Fear of the English Men of War. 'Tis advifed from Malaga the 25th past, that an English Ship called the Dorothy, bound for London with Wine, which was the only English Ship there, as she was going to fail out of the Mole was ftopt by Order of the Governour till he should hear from Court: That another English Ship called the Priscilla coming in from Amsterdam, being informed of what had happened, immediately put to Sea again, and luckily got away: That the English Conful, and some other English Merchants there, had retired into Convents for Fear of being feized : And that the Duke of Wharton was gone to the Spanish Camp. The Advices from the Spanish Army before Gibraltar are, that most of the Cannon being arrived on the 21st past, the Conde de las Torres began to open the Trenches the Night following with five Batallions, upon which the Governour fent out to him to know the Reafons of his Proceedings, but receiving no fatisfactory Answer the Firing be-That the Spaniards have fince loft a gan ; good Number of Men, both by the Fire from the Town and from the Ships of the British Squadron : That the Garrison had made a Sally with a Party of Grenadiers :

nonville's Courier brought hither on the 23d , That the Night of the 24th , past two Spar nith Regiments called Aatworp and Na ples, and an Irith Batallion, mittaking each other for the Enemy, fired upon one another in the Trenches; by which fome Officers and a good many Men were killed: And that the Spanish Army had been confiderably diminished, both by Defertion and Sicknefs which still continued among them to a great Degree.

> Dublin, March 2. Yefterday being the Birth-Day of her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales, the great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and anfwered by Vollics from the Regiments on Duty, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown-Green. At Noort there was a splendid Appearance of the Nobility, and other Perfons of Diffinction, to compliment the Lords Juffices upon this Occafion; and at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies, for the Entertainment of the Ladies.
