On the 8th Inftant late at Night, Don Jofeph Patinno received Advice by a Courier from Cadiz, that Don Antonio Caftanneta arrived there on the 4th Inftant from the Havana, with four Men of War under his Com-mand, having on board Eight Millions of Pieces of Eight of the Treasure of the Flota, one Million being the King of Spain's own Money ; and that the reft of the Flota, confifting of 15 Sail of Ships, had feparated from him at fome Diftance from the Bermuda Iflands, in order to put into fome Port of Galicia or Bifcay.
