Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE cannot but lament the Hardships your Majesty is put under by the unaccountable Conjunction of the Emperour and the King of Spain, with a visible Design of involving the Crown of Great Britain and all Europe in a bloody War, unless unreasonable Concessions are made by your Majesty to the Prejudice of this Kingdom, of such Advantages as have been obtained at the Expence of the Lives and Fortunes of your Subjects, and at length confirmed by the most solemn Treaties; and although this War thus forc'd upon us must inevitably at present lessen the Trade and Fortunes of your Subjects, yet so necessary do we think the Preservation of Gibraltar to the Prosperity of the Trade of this Kingdom, that we are contented to acquiesce under the heavy Burthens we bear, rather than submit to part with it at the most pressing Instances and specious Pretences that can be made. And we cannot but admire that a Prince so tied by Gratitude to your Majesty and this Nation, as the Emperour is, should on any Pretext whatsoever behave himself in a such a Manner as to give Grounds of Suspicion he is become a Guarantee for the Restitution of it. But since his Imperial Majesty is arrived at that Pitch of Grandeur as to make him attempt the Disturbance of the Peace of Europe, we hope the Vigour and Vigilancy of your Majesty's Counsels will take such Measures as shall render his Projects abortive, and convince him, that your Majesty will always interpose your Authority for the keeping the Balance of Power in Europe, when the most solemn Treaties, founded on the strictest Obligations, are not sufficient to bind the Ambition of any Prince.

The Combinations and Contrivances by this Conjunction of the two formidable Powers aforesaid, appear to us not singly confined to the Restitution of Gibraltar and Preservation of the Ostend Trade to the Imperial Crown, but to extend themselves so far into the North, that had not the seasonable Arrival of your Majesty's Fleet in those Parts prevented the Design, a Blow probably might have been struck that had put the whole Power of the North into the Hands of one

Potentate; and what the Consequence of such an Incident might have been, cannot but sufficiently alarm us.

We therefore, desirous of the Continuance and Increase of the Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's Reign, beg Leave to congratulate the Success of your Naval Power; and to assure your Majesty, this Address is attended with sincere Wishes for your long and happy Reign over us, and which we hope will be continued to us in the Protestant Succession, as by Law established, and that your Care of us here may hereafter be rewarded with a Crown of Glory.

Madrid, March 17, N. S. We have Advice from the Army before Gibraltar, that the Conde de las Torres had by a Proclamation forbidden, upon Pain of Death, all Persons in the Camp to write any Particulars whatsoever of what pass'd: So that no distinct Relations come hither, but what the Court receives by Expresses: But our Accounts in general import, that the Siege of Gibraltar goes on very slowly. This Prohibition of writing News from the said Camp, is confirmed by Letters from Malaga, and Cadiz; from which last Place it is advis'd, the 11th Instant, that a Letter which had been written, before that Prohibition, by a Spanish Officer at the Camp to a Friend at Cadiz, related, that on the 23d of February the Besiegers lost a great Number of Men: The same Letter gave an Account likewise, of the Operations of the two following Days, the 24th and 25th; and concluded with these Words, Three most fatal Days to us. The said Advices from Cadiz of the 11th Instant tell us, that the only Intelligence they had had that Week from the Camp with any Certainty, was, that the Besiegers began to fire upon the Town the 4th Instant, and had continued it the following Days.

Bayone, March 23, N. S. Mr. Stanhope, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour, left Madrid the 11th Instant, and late last Night arrived here. Mr. Stratford, Agent for the South Sea Company, who came along with the Ambassadour, was stopt at Pampelona and detained there, by an Order from M. de Patinno sent by an Express and dated three Days after their Departure from Madrid, upon the frivolous Pretence of his not having given in the Accounts of the said Company with the King of Spain; and what renders this Proceeding the more extraordinary, is the Marquess de la Paz's having three several Times assured Mr. Stanhope in the most solemn Manner, and in the Name of his Catholick Majesty, that the said Mr. Stratford should not be molested, and that he might go out of Spain with the Ambassadour in all Safety. His Excellency Mr. Stanhope sets out from hence to Morrow Post for Paris, on his Way to England.
