WE cannot but lament the Hardships your W Majesty is put under by the unaccoun-table Conjunction of the Emperour and the King of Spain, with a vifible Defign of involving the Crown of Great Britain and all Europe in a bloody War, unless unreasonable Concellions are made by your Majefty to the Prejudice of this Kingdom, of fuch Advantages as have been obtained at the Expence of the Lives and Fortunes of your Subjects, and at length confirmed by the most folemn Treaties ; and although this War thus forc'd upon us must inevitably at present less the Trade and Fortunes of your Subjects, yet so necellary do we think the Preservation of Gibraltar to the Prosperity of the Trade of this Kingdom, that we are contented to acquiese under the heavy Burthens we bear, rather than submit to part with it at the most pressing Instances and specious Pretences that can be made. And we cannot but admire that a Prince fo tied by Gratitude to your Majesty and this Nation, as the Emperour is, fhould on any Pretext whatfoever behave himfelf in a fuch a Manner as to give Grounds of Sulpicion he is become a Guarantee for the Reflictution of it. But fince his Imperial Majesty is arrived at that Pitch of Grandeur as to make him attempt the Difturbance of the Peace of Europe, we hope the Vigour and Vigilancy of your Majefty's Counfels will take such Measures as shall render his Projects abortive, and convince him, that your Majesty will always interpose your Authority for the keeping the Balance of Power in Europe, when the most folemn Treaties, founded on the strictest Obligations, are not fufficient to bind the Ambition of any Prince.

The Combinations and Contrivances by this Conjunction of the two formidable Powers aforefaid, appear to us not fingly confined to the Reftitution of Gibraltar and Prefervation of the Oftend Trade to the Imperial Crown, but to extend themselves fo far into the North, that had not the seasonable Arrival of your Majesty's Fleet in those Parts prevented the Defign, a Blow probably might have been ftruck that had put the whole Power of the North into the Hands of one ning the 13th of March Inflant, the Houfe of Dr.

Potentate; and what the Confequence of fuch an Incident might have been, cannot but fufficiently alarm us.

We therefore, defirous of the Continuance and Increase of the Bleffings we enjoy under your Majesty's Reign, beg Leave to congratulate the Success of your Naval Power; and to affure your Majesty, this Address is attend-ed with fincere Wilhes for your long and happy Reign over us, and which we hope will be continued to us in the Protestant Succeffion, as by Law established, and that your Care of us here may hereafter be rewarded with a Crown of Glory.

We have Advice from the Army before Gibraltar, that the Conde de las Torres had by a Proclamation forbidden, upon Pain of Death, all Perfons in the Camp to write any Particulars whatfoever of what palled : So that no diffinct Relations come hither, but what the Court receives by Expresses : But our Accounts in general import, that the Siege of Gibraltar goes on very flowly. This Prohibition of writing News from the faid Camp, is confirmed by Letters from Malaga, and Cadiz; from which last Place it is advised, the 11th Instant, that a Letter which had been written, before that Prohibition, by a Spanish Officer at the Camp to a Friend at Cadiz, re-lated, that on rhe 23d of February the Be-fiegers lost a great Number of Men : The fame Letter gave an Account likewife, of the Operations of the two following Days, the 24th and 25th; and concluded with these Words, Three most fatal Days to us. The laid Advices from Cadiz of the 11th Inftant tell us, that the only Intelligence they had had that Week from the Camp with any Certainty, was, that the Beliegers began to fire upon the Town the 4th Inftant, and had continued it the following Days. Bayone, March 23, N.S. Mr. Stanhope,

His Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour, seft Madrid the 11th Instant, and late last Night arrived here. Mr. Stratford, Agent for the South Sea Company, who came along with the Amballadour, was ftopt at Pampelona and detained there, by an Order from M. de Patinno fent by an Express and dated three Days after their Departure from Madrid, upon the frivolous Pretence of his not having given in the Accompts of the faid Company with the King of Spain ; and what renders this Proceeding the more extraordinary, is the Marquels de la Paz's having three feveral Times affured Mr. Stanhope in the most folemn Manner, and in the Name of his Catholick Majesty, that the faid Mr. Stratford fhould not be molefted, and that he might go out of Spain with the Ambaffadour in all Safety. His Excellency Mr. Stanhope fets out from hence to Morrow Post for Paris, on his Way to England.
