Crown, and confirmed to us by the most Majesty and your People, might well have folemn Treaties, and the infolent Memorial furprized any Vigilance less than your Majesty by the Imperial Refident, are fuch flagrant Instances of violated Faith and intolerable Arrogance, as cannot but raile a just Indignation in the Breafts of all your loyal Subjects.

The feafonable Precautions taken by your Majesty to prevent Deligns fo destructive to the darling Interest of your People ; your equipping such Fleets for the Safety and Honour of the Nation, must give every true Briton a sensible Pleasure, and your Majesty's Enemies a fecret Dread.

That a Popth Prince can be a proper Protector of the Church of England, or a fit Guardian of the Laws and Liberties of a Pro-teftant People, is fo very abfurd, that the very Thoughts of placing fuch a Pretender on your Majesty's Throne, must infpire every one that hath any Concern for his Religion or Liberty with the utmost Detestation.

For our Parts, we shall Chearfully contribute to the vigorous carrying on that War which Self Defence hath made Neceflary, and to the Support of your Majesty, against these Pretenders and all their Adherents, well knowing that every Thing that is valuable or worth living for, to a free People, intirely depends on the Continuance of the Protestant Succession in your Illustrious House; where that it may continue till Time shall be no more, is, and shall be the confant Prayer of

Your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.
