Eft Pleasure in the Course of your Majesty's happy and fuccessful Administration, your great Tenderness of your Subjects, in re-trenching as much as possible the Expence which the first made necessary; and now that your Majesty is unavoidably drawn into the last, for the Safety of the whole Community, in its facred as well as civil Interests, in no 1 fs Danger from the plain Meaning and Tendency of late Treaties, than from their more hidden and fecret Stipulations in Favour of a Popifh Pretender ; your People cannot but contribute with the utmost Chearfulnels what is neceflary for fo great and good an End, when they know at the fame Time that it will be difpenfed with fo frugal a Hand ; and that to these ordinary Forces, necessary in the prefent Juncture, your Majefty will fuperadd that more invincible Power, which confifts in the Wildom that governs and reregulates the Ufe of Arms, by a good Coun-fel, and which makes their Succefs by the Juffice of the Undertaking, to depend upon that all-powerful Aid, without which the greatest Armies are but Weakness, and with which the finalleft are victorious.

By the propitious Influences of that Aid and Protection, be your Majesty's Person fafe from Harm amidst the Hostilities of War; and may your glorious Struggle to preferve the Balance of Power in Europe, ferve either timely to compose those Differences which threaten War and Confusion, and prevent their coming to a Head; or after a fuccessful War, happily terminate in a profound and lafting Peace, which inftead of Scenes of Blood, may give to your Majesty the more agreeable Profpect of feeing Trade in all its Branches, and Learning in all its Parts, flourish and prosper in their respective Nurseries and Seminaries.

W E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal

nions derive from your auspicious Governa ment : And we regard your Majesty, as raised up by Divine Providence, to be the powerful Support of the Liberties of Europe, and of that due Ballance of Power in it which the ex-orbitant Ambition of Ibme alpiring Powers threatens to overturn.

Your Majefty's vigilant Care and Sagacity in penetrating into the fecret pernicious Defigns of those Foreign Powers, (fo contrary to the highest Obligations of Gratitude, and to the Faith of Publick Treaties) which now plainly appear to have been levell'd against the rightful Poffessions of Great Britain, the beneficial Commerce of your Subjects, and happy Establishment of the Crown in your illustrious Family; your confummate Wifdom in entring-into proper Alliances; taking fuch early and necellary Measures to render those destructive Designs abortive, and steady Firmnels in the Profecution of them, have been defervedly approved and applauded by your Britifh Parliament; and thefe renew'd Inftances of your tender and ever watchful Concern for the Security and Welfare of your People, give you a just Title to reign in their Hearts.

And as we doubt not of the chearful Concurrence of all your faithful Subjects with your Majefty, in the Meafures your Wildom thall think needful, to fruftrate the Coun-fels and Enterprizes of ungrateful and perfidious Powers ; lo we for ourfelves and those of our Perswasion, can with Confidence assure your Majesty of our unanimous Resolution, to the utmost of our Power, in our feveral Stations, to oppose all the Enemies of your Government Abroad or at Home; and parti-cularly all their detestable Projects in Favour of an attainted Popifh Pretender.

And we are fully perfwaded, that the late infolent Indignities offer'd to your facred Majesty by the Imperial Resident, in the Name of his Master, will be so far from answering the evil Intentions propoled by them, as ra-ther to excite in all your loyal Subjects a just Refentment of fuch injurious and provoking Usage, and to unite their Zeal for the Honour and Service of your Government, in which their own Interest and Happines is to vifibly bound up.
