To the King's most Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Burgefles, and other Principal Inhabitants of the Borough of Reading, in the County of Berks.

## Most Gracious Sovereign,

W E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal VV Subjects, think ourfelves under the higheft Obligations of Duty to express our utinost Refentments at the pernicious Meafures entered into by two great and formidable Potentates, to feize the important Town of Gibraltar, and to deprive us of one of our most valuable Branches of Commerce, which have been affured to us by folemn Treaties; and what most fensibly affects us, to impose a Popifh Pretender on this brave and free Nation, in exchange for the best Government and beft of Kings.

To fee a Prince, from whom this Nation (by his own Acknowledgment) deferves Renums of Gratitude and good Services, engage in fuch odious Confederacies, must raife the strongett Indignation in every Briton's Breaft.

But to your Majesty's great Wildom and Penetration it is owing, that their fecret Defigns were timely difcovered; and to your p udent Precautions, that they were baffled and rendred Abortive.

That any foreign Minister should, in fo fhameful and scandalous a Manner, abuse the Liberty of having free Accels unto your Majesty's facred Person, as to deliver an infamous Libel into your Royal Hands, and in a most tlaring Manner prefume to publish and dif-perfe the fame, is fuch a flagrant Instance of Infolence that is not to be equalled, and fills us with a Refentment equal to the great Affront. This Outrage on Majefty, (the Effect of impotent Malice and enraged Difappointment) discovers the Weakness both of their Politicks and Caule; and at the fame

will, by an uninterrupted Succeffion in your Time furnishes your faithful Subjects with a Rustrious Family, continue the Happine's of proper Occasion of demonstrating to the this Nation down to the latest Postcrity. World, how entirely your Majesty possess their Hearts and Attections.

Amidst all these Dangers, Threats, and Infults, we have the Pleasure and Satisfaction to fee both Houfes of Parliament faithfully and refolutely fupporting your Majesty's and the Nation's Interest, manifesting a becoming Zeal at the Affronts and Indignities offered to your facred Perfon, and treating the Authors thereof with fuitable Contempt.

Give us Leave, most gracious Sir, to alfure your Majesty, that our Loyalty is too firm to be shaken by such Attempts; and that we will, to the utmost of our Power and Ability, affift and fupport your Majefty in Defence of your Royal Perlon, and our undoubted Rights and Privileges. That your Majefty may have a long and

prosperous Reign over an obedient People, and that all your Counfels may prove fucceisful, and terminate in the defireable Bleffing of Peace upon just and honourable. Terms, are,
