The Affront and Indignity offered your most facred Majesty by the insolent Memorial delivered by Monsieur de Palm, the Emperour's Resident, and the unparalell'd Insolency in printing and publishing the same throughout the Kingdom, raiseth our highest Re-

fentment.

The Attempt made against our Liberties, Trade, and (what is most valuable to us) your Majesty's Person and Government, did most justly surprize us, especially when we considered it came from a Prince under the strictest Ties of Gratitude; one who was established on his Throne by your Majesty's Assistance, and owes so much to the Valour of the British Nation, and for whose Sake so much Blood and Treasure has been expended. Can his Imperial Majesty be so forgetful of the Laws of Hospitality; so unjust as to employ those Ports to the Ruin of our Trade which he enjoys by our Generofity; and in Concert with another neighbouring Prince, break through all the most solemn Leagues and Treaties, with a View to wrest from us the important Fortresles of Gibraltar and Port Mahon, and bring in a Popish Pretender, an abjur'd Fugitive, a Tool of Rome, and the Bane of Liberty? one who from his Cradle hath been train'd up in Principles abfolutely destructive to both our Civil and Religious Rights, would entirely deprive both the present Age and late Posterity of those happy Advantages and inestimable Blesfings procur'd to us by King William (of Glorious Memory) at the Revolution, the Preservation whereof we owe to your Majesty's most gracious Government.

We assure your Majesty, that we shall be always ready to the utmost of our Power, Hand and Heart, to support and defend your Majesty's Royal Person, Crown and Dignity,

against all Opposers whatsoever.

We entirely rely on your facred Majesty's known Goodness and paternal Care for the Welfare of your People; may all your Counfels be crown'd with Success, may your Reign be long and glorious, and may your Royal Illustrious Family inherit your Kingdoms, Virtues, and the intire Love and Affection of your Subjects to latest Posterity.
